

## LATE OIL DEVELOPMENTS CENTER AROUND CADDO POOL IN STEPHENS COUNTY; GOOD EXTENSION REPORTED

FORT WORTH, April 7.—

Oil developments in the Caddo pool in Stephens county, Texas, have been reported from Stephens county. The most important of these is a one-mile extension to the north for the Caddo pool, which has added a great strip of new territory for development.

This extension is furnished by the completion of the Walter Manning No. 1, of the Mid-Kansas Oil & Gas Company, which is flowing from 500 to 800 barrels daily after a heavy shot. It is located one mile north of the Tullis well which previously had been regarded as the outpost of production in that direction.

The Tullis well came in last August for 500 barrels daily and has held up remarkably well. It is now making around 440 barrels, indicating that territory will have a long life.

The town of Caddo now surrounded by proven territory is facing a town lot drilling campaign and efforts are being made to consolidate these town lot leases into a syndicate so that the entire production under the town may be secured with as little drilling as possible. Appeals have been made to the Texas Railroad Commission to assist in bringing such an agreement into effect.

In the extreme southeastern part of Caddo pool the new E. Y. Jennings No. 2, of the Sun Company has been drilled a little deeper and the flow has increased from 3,000 to 5,000 barrels daily. The depth is only 3,220 feet, the shallowest of all the big producers in that territory, the usual depth being around 3,500 feet. This is now the largest producer in the county and as such is attracting much attention.

In the city of Breckenridge the second townsite test has been started by the Central Development Company which has a twenty-four acre tract just inside the city limits. Two other wells will be drilled on the lease.

With the marked increase in activity about Breckenridge, the city is taking steps to offer better facilities to the oil operator. The housing situation there now is one of the

pressing problems. Walker Caldwell, leading operator, has just purchased from Mrs. Ida Yeola a tract of 104 acres adjoining the city and this will be subdivided into lots for an addition to the city. Adjoining this property a large lake has been constructed to furnish an adequate water supply. Mrs. Yeola was paid \$200,000 cash for this property, all of which is regarded as proven in the oil pool but which will not be used for drilling purposes.

Just northeast of Breckenridge Walker Caldwell has sold a lease on 100 acres to the Cooper-Henderson Oil Company for \$225,000. In the old Ranger district interest now is centered on the McCloskey No. 1 of the Texas Pacific Coal and Oil Company, the discovery well of the field. It ceased to produce several months ago but is now being cleaned out for the first time and possibly will come back with a paying production when the hole is again cleared. All of the other McCloskey wells on the same tract, have continued to produce down to date.

There is a rumor circulating that the Texas Pacific has drilled the old well deeper and that a deeper ray has been struck but this has not been confirmed and is not generally believed.

Other reports received are: Navarro county—The McPherson well in the Rice shallow field, which recently encountered a new sand at 419 feet, has again been bailed and shows that it will be good for eight or ten barrels daily. The deep test of the Cor-Tex Oil Company, just south of the city limits of Corsicana, is drilling at 2,400 feet. The Richmond well of the Oklahoma Gasoline and petroleum company is drilling at 2,400 feet.

Childress county—The Shields well of the Barnes-Buster interests is setting casing at 600 feet to drill in it. It is reported there is oil in the hole at the depth.

Lipscomb county—Work has been resumed on the Hamilton Oil Company's well near Higgins after a long shut down. It is now drilling at 1,200 feet.

## STAND OF WEST TEXAS REGARDING BOLL WORM DEVELOPS OPPOSITION

bring the union men to stand by the old established organizations. Attached to the communication was a brief of the engineers in the wage case now pending in Washington. The covering letter said:

"You are hereby advised that the present unfortunate situation is brought about by persons who have no right or authority to declare a legal strike, and that you are under no obligation to recognize in any respect the conditions now existing as having the status of a legal strike under laws of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers."

"Do not be influenced by the specious promises of irresponsible persons who have no standing or support that will enable them to carry out their engagements."

**Can Not Raise Wages**  
The Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen pointed out in their communication that the railroads could not raise wages without violating the provisions of the Cummins-Keefe transportation act, to which the fourteen recognized railway unions had subscribed.

"Under this act," the letter said, "the railroads are not permitted to give their employees an increase in compensation, except as provided by law, and should they desire to do so it would be a physical impossibility for them to recognize the John Grannan organization (the Chicago Yardmen's association) by granting increases in pay to yardmen and our membership should understand that there is nothing that Grannan can do to relieve their financial situation, and the question now must be first passed upon by the board created by law."

S. E. Hobbs, international president of the switchmen's union of North America, who arrived today from Buffalo, called a mass meeting of all switchmen in the Chicago district for tomorrow.
