## HUNDREDS OF COTTON CHOPPERS ARE NEEDED IN STAMFORD DISTRICT

STAMFORD, June 12.—Several hundred cotton choppers will be needed in Jones county in the next few weeks, according to the special agent of the United States employment service here.

Much of the cotton of Jones county has just begun to protrude from the ground, having been delayed by the protracted dry weather of early spring and then by the long spell of a rainy weather. In the Hawley section there has come a demand for several hundred hands for general farm work. In Fisher county much cotton has already been chopped, while a great amount has not yet been planted due to inundations and wet weather.

A number of laborers familiar with harvesting but who have recently been employed in the oil fields are passing through Stamford daily en route to the wheat fields of north central west Texas, particularly in the Crockett and Chilton sections, where the crops are reported as unusually good.

While the labor situation will not be as serious as it was last year, it will by no means be easily solved, declared the special agent of the U. S. employment service.

All persons wishing hands for the fields and those wishing employment should apply by letter to the U. S. employment service, co-operating with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, Stamford, Texas. The service is conducted by the government and is absolutely free to all persons.

**Foundation Laid for Laundry.**  
The cement foundation for the new union laundry has been laid. Building material is on the ground and brick is being delivered. An extension to the proposed main building will house a dry cleaning and pressing department.

## GLOVIS GAINS WIDE PUBLICITY THROUGH ROAD MARKING SIGNS

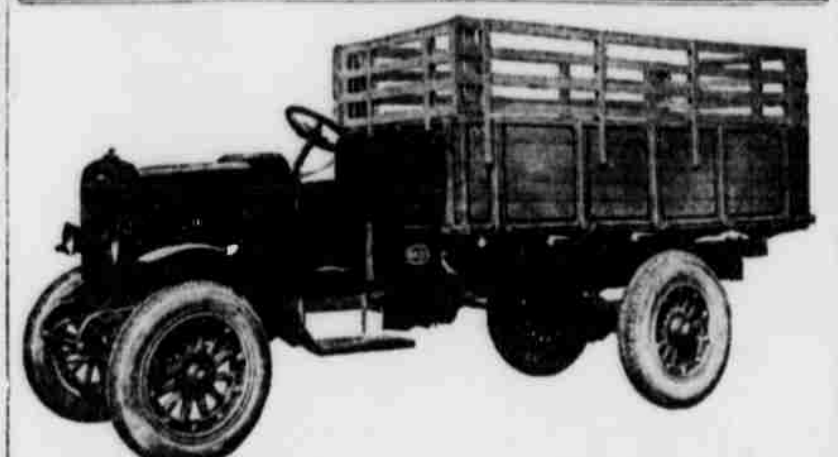

CLOVIS, New Mex., June 12.—Clovis as the gateway to New Mexico is being heralded throughout this state and western Texas as the result of the latest publicity movement of the local Chamber of Commerce.

route, and the Hancock Highway now pass through Clovis, and at each point within the radius of several hundred miles, where these highways are intersected by other prominent highways, a sign will be placed showing the direction and distance to Clovis.
