FT. WORTH AND DENVER SHORT MANY GRAIN CARS

WICHITA FALLS, Aug. 7.—Since July 4 the Ft. Worth and Denver rail road has been short 142 grain cars a day on an average, according to a telegram sent by the Traffic Bureau of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to the Interstate Commerce Commission at Washington. The telegram (which is mentioned in the following language of the situation on other lines.)
 "Situation very bad on Quanah, Amarillo, Pacific, Abilene & Southern, Wichita Valley, Crescent and Santa Fe. All storage facilities full and overflowing."
 "Number of elevators closed down entirely account receipts beyond capacity and loss of grain being stored in open on account. It is now raining in many places throughout the grain belt in Texas and unless immediate relief is given farmers and grain men will incur heavy losses."
 "The estimated production of wheat this year has been placed conservatively at 15,000,000 bushels, requiring approximately 12,500 "unit" cars to handle something like 2,000 cars of 1919 wheat is still to be moved.
 "It is estimated that the production of wheat in Texas and Oklahoma has been about 10,000,000 bushels. This wheat has been stored in bins and in elevators. In one or two instances W. O. W. bins were converted into granaries. Everything that afforded protection to wheat was introduced into the service. Even five residences were partly turned into receptacles to care for the wheat, the occupants circumventing their living quarters to the closest possible proximity to the grain. Every vestige of evidence tending to bring conviction to Washington authorities is being marshaled daily.

SPIRITUAL RECONSTRUCTION NEEDED IN EASTERN EUROPE

NEW YORK, Aug. 7.—Leon Karsinsky, chairman of the Central Relief Committee, at Chambers street, New York, has returned from eastern Europe after an absence of nearly six months. He investigated Jewish conditions in Poland and Lithuania and has had full opportunity to study the situation.
 Mr. Karsinsky says that the great need of Eastern European Jewry was reconstruction of Jewish life. All communities had been destroyed and rebuilt was a very low state. He concluded that the relief to be given in the future should not bear the character of charity, but rather of aid in upbuilding the Jewish communities that have been destroyed.
 Mr. Karsinsky will present to the Central Relief Committee a complete report of his studies and conclusions. The report will be published as soon as it is ready.
