The tots began to gather at Fifth and Polk streets about 8 o'clock, and by 9:30 the entire neighborhood was present and ready to go. Five trucks and a large number of automobiles had been arranged for to convey them to the picnic grounds, the members of the Kiwanis club being among the heavy contributors.

Arriving at the canyon, all sorts of sports were indulged in, including wading, rolling in the sand and games of various kinds. When the noon hour arrived, the kiddies were treated to a fed in army style, each one passing the commissary and receiving his allotment of the big dinner. Refreshments in the form of ice cream and lemonade also were in evidence.

Captain A. M. Hoffbrook said last night that the picnic was a grand success, a large portion of which he attributed to the co-operation received at the hands of local citizens.

MAN RUN OVER BY CAR REPORTED IMPROVING

A. Johnson, who was run over by an automobile being driven by R. H. McAlister, of Washburn, yesterday morning about 11 o'clock, at the intersection of Fifth and Polk streets, and who was taken to the local sanitarium for treatment, was sufficiently recovered last night to be taken to his home at the Mason hotel. He was not seriously injured, although he received several lacerations about the body and cuts on the face and head.

The old gentleman, who was 61 years of age, was struck while crossing Polk street from the east. After the accident he was picked up by passersby and taken to the Hamill Drug store, where he was given immediate attention, and later carried to the hospital.

SAYS STREET RAILWAY IS NOT PAYING AFFAIR

The Amarillo street railway system is not a paying proposition, according to Superintendent Robert Bellamy. He states, however, that the patronage is gradually building up. Business dropped off about three weeks ago, when a change was made in the schedule, but is about back to normal. With only three cars running, 162 trips a day are made on Polk street, giving an eight-minute service, and on each of the loops a 16-minute service. Glenwood and the North Side line get service every hour.

OIL SHOWING REPORTED IN HALL COUNTY TEST

MEMPHIS, Tex., Aug. 14.—Oil sand was reported struck in the Virginia-Texas well, 25 miles southwest of Memphis, last night at 10 o'clock, at a depth of 2919 feet. Operations were immediately stopped, awaiting instructions from headquarters.

No information is yet available as to the amount of oil in the well.

A number of citizens from Memphis visited the well this morning and confirmed the fact that oil was in evidence. Samples were brought in town, considerable gas pressure the reaching of oil sand.

LOCAL MEN SPEAK IN NEFF'S BEHALF

STINNETT AND WORKS ADDRESS LARGE CROWDS AT CLAUDE AND CHANDLER

A. S. Stinnett, chairman of the Panhandle Neff for Governor club, and Judge F. P. Works, of Amarillo, addressed large crowds at Claude and Chandler yesterday, in the interest of the candidacy of Pat M. Neff.

The speaking at Claude took place at 12 o'clock noon, and despite the fact that it was noon there was a large attendance, including many women. At Chandler the speaking took place at 3 o'clock in the afternoon before a large audience.

The prevailing sentiment seemed to be in the favor of the Wagon man for governor, they declared. Both speakers made addresses at each place.

CEMETERY ASSOCIATION MAY BE ORGANIZED

A movement has been put on foot by local citizens to organize a cemetery association and to take over the local cemetery from the county government. A meeting has been called for all persons interested in the formation of such an organization for 10 o'clock Tuesday morning at the Central Presbyterian church.

The work of maintaining the cemetery is now under the supervision of the commissioners' court which at most other places it is handled through a cemetery association, it is pointed out.

SPEAKER IS VIGOROUSLY CHEERED AS HE UPHOLDS PLATFORM OF WAGO MAN

"If the open shop issue is a good issue now, why wasn't it an issue when he was in Wichita Falls in the spring?" (Cheers.)

Issue Is Explained
He then explained carefully the meaning of the bonus open shop issue. On one side, he said, in explanation of the issue, stand the men who work with their hands, the laboring men. On the other side stand the men who employ the workers, the employers. The laboring men have organized themselves into unions for mutual protection and to better the condition of themselves and their families. It is

their right. Who is it who would strike them down?"

On the other hand, the employers, who have the money to hire the laborers, from what they call an Open Shop association.

On the one side are those who would pay high wages as they can get; on the other side are those who want as cheap labor as they can secure.

"And sometimes, out of a situation such as this," declared Mr. Thomas, "comes conflict."

Have Right to Strike

"One side says 'I will not work.' They strike. They have a right to strike. The weapon of the strike is the only weapon which the laboring man can use for his protection against the employer. But sometimes, after he has quit the job and another has taken it, he gets sudden and resorts to violence and to destruction of property. He had a right to quit work. He has no right to resort to violence. And the other man has a right to take the job that he has quit if he wanted to. And capital has a right to employ non-union men, as it sees fit."

"But capital, sometimes, resorts to the bayonet in an effort to reach an arbitrary settlement of a strike. And this is wrong."

Now, with this condition in Texas, said a big man when it elected to office, could do nothing in the way of passing laws to apply in this situation, who is appealing to prejudice and declaring that he expiates the cause of one class—the wealthier, stronger class—against another.

"Permit me to quote again from Cox. Cox says that the man who would stir up class hatred in this country is more dangerous than a Russian Bolshevik. I have these words about the neck of Joseph Weldon Bailey, as he seeks to stir his hobby to Austin."

Wants Fair Man

Mr. Thomas then, at length, declared that he favored the man who could get into office in a position to act with fairness to both sides in a matter of this sort, a man who could stand beside capital if capital is right, and beside labor if labor is right, and who could reason either when either is wrong. Neff would follow the example of James M. Cox in Ohio, who settled in his three terms all serious labor troubles without ever being forced to use the bayonet.

It would cost some a bench collapsed, precipitating Felix Franklin and a woman others to the ground.

"Never mind, friends," laughed Mr. Thomas, seeing no one was hurt, "every time an anti-Bailey man goes down he lands on his feet."

The crowd laughed.

He demanded money to tell what law he would urge to aid the advocates of the open shop.

He laughed to scorn the attempt. Bailey is making to make the farmers believe some day an eight-hour law may apply to them. He said no law fixing hours had ever been in or would be placed on the statute book, except laws regulating the hours of employees of the state and government.

Neff's Land Plan

With references to the Neff land plan, he said this had been grossly misrepresented. He declared that the Neff land plan is one which does not touch a single resident of Texas. It applies to non-residents of Texas holding large bodies of land for speculative purposes. Some lawyers, he said, declared it would be constitutional, and some say it would not be, but he assured the people of Texas that they need not be afraid of the much talked of land plan.

He discussed Bailey's opposition to the farm loan bank, declaring that his appeal to the prejudices of the farmers did not measure up to his failure to advocate the measures which do the farmers the most good. He referred to the fact that he lined up with the Republicans in the senate to lend money at one and a half percent interest to

several banks, but refused to give his approval of the federal land bank, which has loaned more than \$25,000,000 to Texas farmers alone.

He referred to Bailey's utterance that the farmers of west Texas, during the drought year in the region south of the Panhandle, did not want the government to lend them money; they had too much to do, he said, he said, and the last man who should mock anyone for borrowing. He borrowed \$156,000 from Henry Clay Pierce in a single day. He was the champion borrower of his age. Jim Ferguson borrowed \$128,000 from Otto Wehrmann, the governor, and was impeached for it. Should the people punish one man for a crime and elect another who did the same thing?

Bailey's War Record

Chief for Bailey's war record came from every side. He first discussed his position on suffrage. He said Bailey had once stated that he preferred the school to women in politics. "Every man to his own taste," he declared, "and this to be a progressive and an enlightening age, and suffrage was coming to women around the world, Belgium and Canada led in having granted it."

He quoted the war record of Pat M. Neff and declared that Bailey had done more than he did not even make a four-minute speech for his country in time of her trouble. He declared that he loved the red, the white and the blue in the flag too well to want to separate any man who would favor the wearing any of those colors with a streak of yellow. (Cheers.)

He declared that Bailey had not been above in his opposition to the war. Emma Goldman had opposed it. She is in Russia.

Eugene Debs had opposed it. He is in prison.

Victor Berger had opposed it. He was ousted from congress.

Joe Bailey had opposed it, and he was in Texas running for governor.

In conclusion, the speaker made a strong appeal to Thompson and Leoney to join forces with the original Neff men to fight a common enemy.
