

## OFFICERS TO BE ELECTED TONIGHT

BODY WILL ALSO DISCUSS MANY MATTERS OF IMPORTANCE AT SESSION.

At the annual meeting of the members of the Amarillo Business Men's association, which will be held at 1:30 o'clock tonight in the city hall, officers for the ensuing year will be elected and other business of importance transacted.

Four new directors are to be chosen at this session of the body and plans will be made for a "Good Fellowship" luncheon to be given at an early date. Committees to arrange the program and the details of the luncheon will be appointed.

Among other things that will be discussed will be the "bad check" problem. Business men declare that they have checks returned to them from the banks every day because of insufficient funds or as the result of forgeries and it may be determined that no checks in future will be cashed for strangers.

It is also declared that never before have so many people sought credit, yet never has it been necessary for the merchant to exercise the utmost caution in making credit extensions. It is planned at this meeting to take some steps to limit the tendency which will be extended to those who seek credit.

Secretary R. O. Walker urges that every business man be present at the meeting this evening.

## Declares Panhandle In Excellent Shape

A. C. Houston, president of the Panhandle Lumber company, who is here on a trip of inspection, makes the interesting assertion that the Panhandle is in better shape than almost any other section of the United States.

Mr. Houston states that agricultural and cattle land is cheaper than any land of equal productivity in the country and that the opportunities here are greater than elsewhere. He thinks that there will be no considerable amount of unemployment in the Panhandle-Plains country and looks for no hard times.

While in Amarillo Mr. Houston will be the guest of John E. Hill, the vice president and manager of the Panhandle Lumber company.
