Appeal is Made by Red Cross to American Womanhood.
Call upon the women of Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas to make 250,000 garments and 10,000 infant's huyette, a total of about 220,000 individual articles, to relieve dire distress of Eastern European children refugees, was made today in an announcement by Miss Katherine Burlington, director of volunteer service,

of the five states of the Southwestern Division is the largest, proportionally, of any Red Cross division in the United States and is based upon the exceptional record of the women of this area during the war.

The 630 chapters of the division will each shortly be assigned definite quotas as their share of the huge task. As garments are completed they will be shipped direct to Store #24, American Red Cross, Bush Terminal, Brooklyn, New York, market for export.

A new feature of the work, which will be used for the first time, is that chapters will be allowed to mark their shipments the name of the country to which the garments must be sent. The list of countries and the percentage of the total garments which each will receive is as follows: Poland, 40 per cent, Austria, 20 per cent, Hungary, 20 per cent, Czechoslovakia, 10 per cent, Baltic States, 5 per cent, Italian States, 5 per cent.

The clothing will be distributed in Poland, Austria, and Hungary, the countries of all these in Europe most desperately in need, by means of child welfare units which will be established by the Red Cross for that purpose. In the other countries various Red Cross agencies will be used.

The call includes all articles of clothing worn by boys and girls, ranging in age from infancy to 14 years. Any
