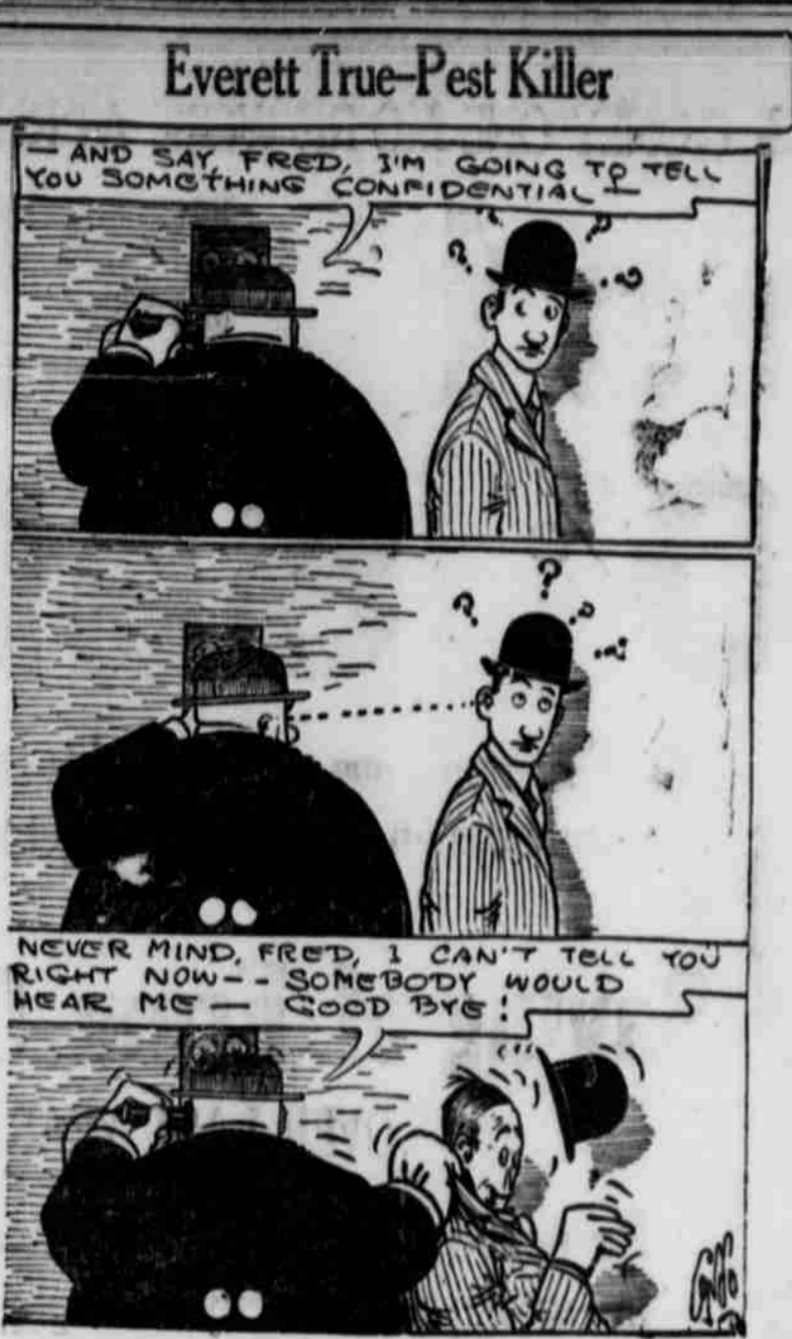

EXPLOSION WRECKS CHICAGO ELEVATOR; SIX MILLION DOLLAR LOSS.
 CONTINUED FROM PAGE ONE
 only one body has been taken from the ruins. Four others are known to have escaped.
 CHICAGO, March 19.—Isolation of the large elevator prevented greater destruction of life and property and many buildings near the wrecked structure. The force of the explosion seemed to have passed over the cottages nearby, taking effect on more distant buildings, largely at the expense of windows.
 It was some time after the detonation before the firemen could reach the scene, and it was more than an hour before coherent intelligence of what had occurred could be obtained. Hundreds of inquiries for miles around the elevators came to the police and newspapers, but no information could be given until the police had found a soundly night watchman, I. T. Walker. He told of the fire in a chute and the blast that followed. The wreckage lying for blocks around told a tale of terrific force, but billows of smoke from the smouldering grain prevented close inspection of the devastation. Shattered glass was reported from as far as five miles from the elevator while reports of feeling the shock came from 57 miles away.
 The elevator was completed only last fall and consisted of 22 lower compartments. The steel section of the elevator was not much damaged, it was earned after the smoke had cleared away, but the top, made of concrete and steel was blown in a million pieces, while the cement covering of the steel towers was riddled so badly much of it will have to be replaced.

HEREFORD STREETS TO BE GRADED AND PAVED
 Special to The News.
HEREFORD, Texas, March 19.—The City commission hopes to be able to do some street improvement work the coming summer, if financial conditions permit and, with that in view, have been securing reliable engineering data that will enable them to figure costs, etc. W. D. Howren, of the Wood Engineering Co., has spent several days in Hereford, establishing bench marks, grades and levels, making profiles, and establishing old corners. He has given in the commission a verbal report and will file a written one a little later. Without this information the city could not proceed intelligently in street improvement work. The city is especially desirous to construct at least one through macadamized highway running east and west and one north and south of fixing up First street, opposite the depot, so that it will present a more sightly and desirable view to passengers on the Santa Fe train. The commission is studying the entire subject of street improvement this year that will come in with the limited money available, and will determine upon a definite course of action shortly.

BROWNVILLE, Texas, Mar. 19.—Sheriff Vann of Cameron county, departed this afternoon for San Antonio, having in custody a prisoner whose name was not divulged, who will be placed in the Bexar county jail for safekeeping. It is understood the prisoner has confessed to complicity in the murder of Mary Schroeder, Rio Hondo school girl, on February 24. A Mexican charged with the crime was taken several days ago.
Extension Arm for Spotlight.

It consists of a small telescoping arm, with clamp and universal joint at one end, and a ball-shaped handle at the other.
