

GEORGIA FARMER MUST FACE COURT ON MURDER CHARGE

PEONAGE CASE IS ATTRACTING ATTENTION OF OFFICIALS OVER STATE.

ATLANTA, March 29.—Investigation by Jasper county grand jury of the deaths of the eight negro laborers on the farm of John Williams, wealthy plantation owner, with a view to indictment of Williams and Clyde Manning, a negro who is said to have led off the Williams had the negroes slain because of their resistance to peonage, and also to inquire into any possible connection with the affair of Williams' three sons, was asked today by Governor Denny, Judge A. B. Parker, of the judicial circuit court, in which county is located, replied that he would call the grand jury to meet April 15.

The governor, after a conference with state and federal officials, telegraphed Judge John B. Hutchinson of the Oklahoma judicial circuit, asking an extradition of Williams and Manning in Newton County. At the same time Solicitor General Brand of the State Mountains circuit declared Williams and Manning would go to trial at Covington within three weeks.

 lam; cattle, 26 per cent ad valorem; sheep under one year old \$1 per head; sheep over 1 year, \$2 per head; four or frozen beef, veal, mutton, lamb and pork, 20 per cent; other meats, 15 per cent ad valorem; cotton having a staple of more than one and one-eighth inches in length, 70 per cent; cotton goods, 70 per cent; clothing, 70 per cent; carpet goods, 45 per cent; butter and butter substitutes, 50 per cent; hides of cattle, 15 per cent ad valorem, and upon various grades of tobacco, from 50c to \$2.50 per pound. Many other farm products are given protection by the Forney bill, but only those items grown to some extent at least in Texas are quoted above.

Many republican congressmen expressed in an embarrassing condition. President Harding's insistence that the farmers be given a protective tariff. Quite a number of them voted for the Forney bill in the expectation that Wilson would veto it, which he did. Those who voted for it under the assumption had little difficulty in explaining their votes to the manufacturing interests, for they had the excuse that their votes would under the circumstances do no harm to manufacturers.

But when the bill comes up for consideration in April the circumstances will be different, for they will know that if they again vote for the bill they will be passing it on to a president who wants to sign it, and if he should veto against it in order to please the New England big business interests they will have to reverse their votes and incur the appearance of inconsistency. Likewise, they will place themselves in opposition to the head of their party, Mr. Harding, who is said to have a memory for those who oppose his wishes.

From the present indications it seems likely that practically every congressman from the west will vote for the emergency bill; that most of the New England and Middle Atlantic representatives will do likewise, knowing that it will remain in effect but six months, and with a mental reservation to oppose similar protection for the farmers in the permanent tariff bill which will come up for consideration later in the session; and that the majority of the democrats from the South and South west will vote against the bill, in order to attack the administration a little later for having passed it. There is no doubt that it will pass without amendment, as the President desires it not so certain, though probable.

 various sections of the country may be called upon to see what can be done for them. Finance corporation officials have said several times that the western and middle western farmers must be given consideration soon. It apparently was the consensus of opinion in the cabinet discussions, however, that the cotton interests should be the first to receive attention.

The meetings which Mr. Hoover will call, it was said, would be entirely informal and will seek to develop a program of cooperation with practical limits for the disposition of crops. Some officials were said to fear that unless the farmers can be given assurance of a friendliness on the part of the government in marketing their products, there will be a reduction in the acreage of all crops. It was believed that first hand information obtained in conferences such as those proposed by Mr. Hoover might suggest new methods for domestic handling and exportation of all agricultural products.

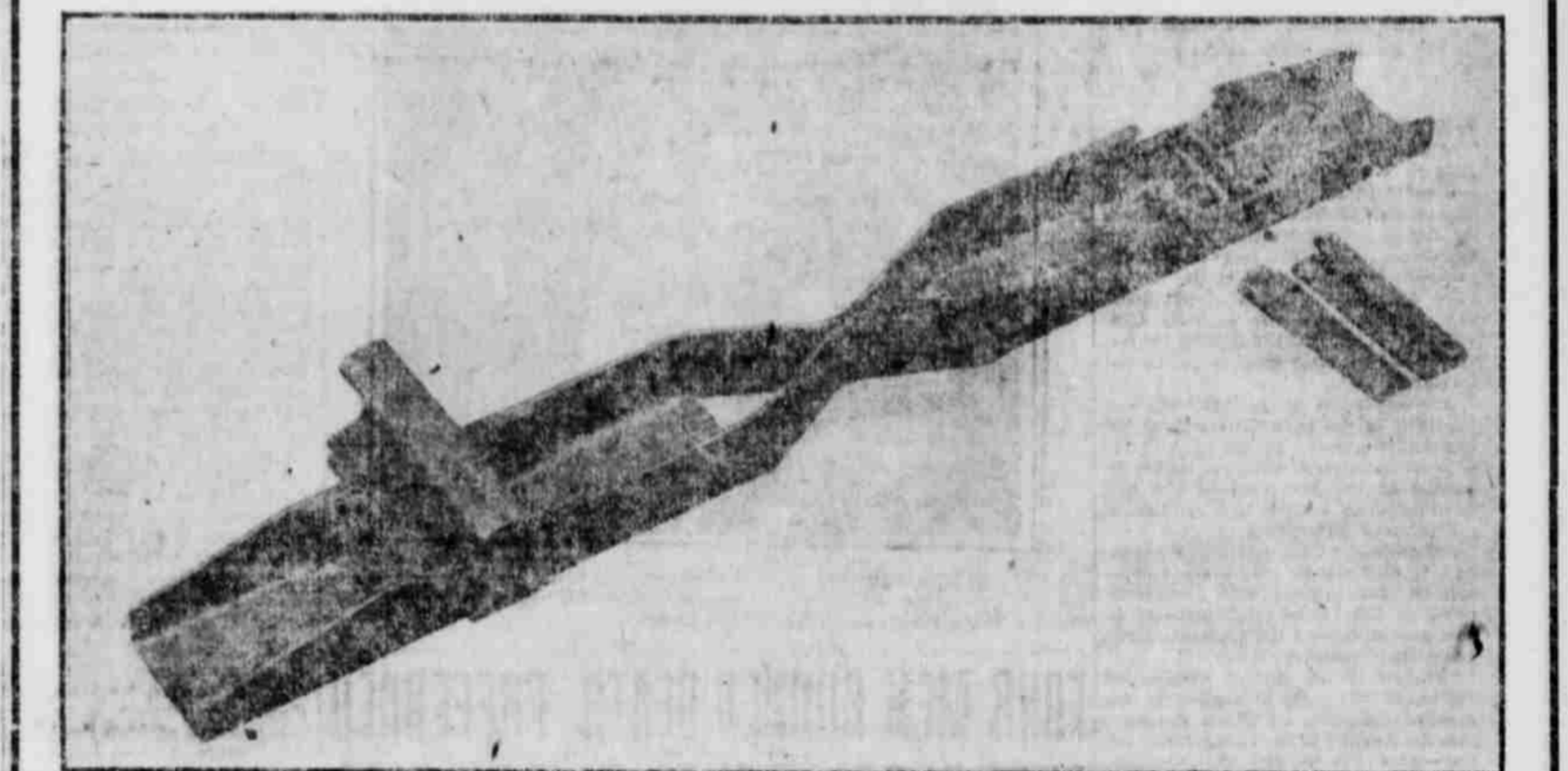
