Market News

COTTON PRICES ON GRAIN PRICES ARE STEADY DECLINE LOW; NO DEMAND

PROVISIONS OFFERED FREELY BUT PRICES CONTINUE DOWNWARD.

NEW YORK, April 8.—The cotton market was very quiet again today but the unsatisfactory character of the English labor news was reflected in some further scattering liquidation. Total delivery closed at 12.15 with the general list closing at a net decline of 16 to 17 points.

The market opened unchanged to six points lower owing to reactions from early advances in Liverpool and reports that the English coal miners had refused to confer with the mine owners. Reports of a better tone in the Manchester goods market seemed to modify the influence of the unfavorable labor news but prices gradually waned off under scattered selling.

Lloyd George's statement in the house of commons with reference to the industrial crisis weakened the early afternoon market. The close was within a few points of the lowest. The final tone was steady on reports that Liverpool transport workers were not altogether unanimous on the question of striking in sympathy with the coal miners. The preliminary report of prominent southern authority estimating the reduction in acreage at 23 per cent attracted comparatively little comment.

Exports for the day were 12,283 bales making 382,484 so far this season. Receipts 20,921; United States port stocks 1,421,244.

Perhaps there would have been more selling on the English industrial crisis but it may be for the conference between the government and leading officials with a view of retarding the congestion of cotton in the south and reopening foreign markets. Local traders have felt that there is little hope of an expansion in ordinary—short demand while conditions abroad were so unsettled, but that some way might be found by which to finance shipments of cotton abroad to be held there until demand should revive.

Possibilities in this direction are supposed to have accounted partly for the absence of increased hedge selling or not offerings. Notwithstanding the threatening labor situation, trade advises has reported a better tone in Manchester owing to a revival of demand for cotton goods for India.

Some improvement has also been reported in the export division of the domestic goods market as a result of buying for South America and far Eastern account. Sales of print cloth in the Fall River market for the week were estimated at only 60,000 pieces. Some traders here feel that prospects for government or banking assistance in moving the old crop may possibly encourage the planting of a little more than originally intended, and fertilizer sales during March are said to have shown up better, but a preliminary estimate places average production at 29 per cent.

FINANCIAL

NEW YORK, April 8.—The stock market was extremely lethargic and moderately heavy today. These conditions were directly attributed to higher money rates and increasing apprehension in connection with the British industrial situation.

Deals were lighter and more contracted in scope than at any session in the last fortnight.

Stocks, equipments, motors and low priced rails together with inactive medallions, were often under pressure. High grade rails and representative four hour when the entire list registered lowest prices. Call loans opened and renewed into next week at six per cent, but before midday the paucity of offerings forced the rate to 6½% before the close a 7 per cent rate ruled.

Contrary to expectations, the British labor crisis caused no visible selling of stocks for foreign account.

Sterling bills reacted 4½% from their maximum levels of the midweek and French and Belgian francs registered about 10 points decline.
