

HIGGINS HERO IS BURIED WITH MILITARY HONOR IN ARLINGTON

Special to The News WASHINGTON, June 23.—Rev. M. L. Blankenship and Mrs. Blankenship, of Higgins, Texas, who have been in Washington for some days, today attended the military funeral of their son Donald Moses Blankenship at Arlington cemetery.

Young Blankenship was a member of the famous Sixth Marines who participated in a part in the battle of Belleau Wood where the German advance was stopped and which marked the turning point of the war. Private Blankenship was wounded in action on the sixth of June, 1918 and lived long enough to know that his death would not be in vain.

AUTO LEFT ON STREET MAY BE DEAD MAN'S CAR

DESCRIPTIONS OF TEETH OF SLAIN STRANGER SENT BROADCAST

A possible clue to the identity of the dead man found buried thirteen miles north of Amarillo Monday has been discovered by Sheriff Earl Burson Roark. It is an automobile which has been standing in one place in the city ever since the middle of April.

The man who owned the automobile is known to have had considerable money and was frequently seen in company with questionable characters. Officers think perhaps he was murdered in his automobile, which was buried, left the dead man's automobile standing in Amarillo and left the country.

DUTCH SAY U. S. NOT TO BE KEPT FROM OIL FIELD

REPUBLIC SENDS NOTE TO AMERICA REGARDING DJAMBI LANDS

By Associated Press. THE HAGUE, June 23.—The Dutch government today made public its reply to the American government's note of May 27 protesting against the policy of the Netherlands government with regard to the exploitation of the Djamboe of field of the Dutch East Indies.

The reply dispatched June 21, pointed out that in far back as last October, the minister of the Dutch government, the American minister in an interview with the American press, stated that the Dutch government considered itself bound in negotiations with the Batavia company to have no question of taking over the Djamboe field of the United States.

HEARST ROMPED ON BY LABOR IN STINGING TERMS

GOMPERS DEFENDS HIS STAND ON QUESTION OF AIDING IRISH

DENVER, Colo., June 23.—William Randolph Hearst was denounced on the floor of the convention of the American Federation of Labor today by President Gompers as a "traitor to the cause of America, to the cause of freedom, an enemy of labor and of Ireland."

The veteran labor leader declared that Hearst had attacked him because he had declined to be "scholarship boy" for the president of the United States and because he had tried to "see to it that Mexico shall go undisturbed and not overrun by the American forces."

MEXICO TRIES TO SELL GARLIC EL PASO, TEXAS

EL PASO, TEXAS, June 23.—Mexico is trying to market an excess supply of garlic, according to two communications received by the El Paso chamber of commerce, Refugio C. Lomelin, of Aguascalientes, Mexico, said he has 100,000 pounds of garlic and asks for information on the garlic market and the names of importers who will handle crops.
