PLAINVIEW TO HAVE MEETING REGARDING RAILROAD PROJECT

Special to The News. PLAINVIEW, Dec. 28.—Invitations have been accepted by Clavis, Herford, Floyd, Lockney, Tully, Dimmitt, Otton, Silverton and Abilene to attend a meeting at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in Plainview regarding the construction of a South Plains railroad to Fort Worth. It is expected that acceptances will be received from other towns daily, making probably 25 in all by attendance.

The Plainview railroad commission consisting of E. E. Underwood, chairman; R. P. Smythe, secretary; A. G. Hinn, A. B. Martin, O. M. Utner and T. M. Carter have called the meeting, which will be held in the Board of City Development rooms. Should proper cooperation be given, it is believed that the road could be extended to Clavis, N. M., passing through Otton from the South Plains. The Plainview meeting is being held preparatory to another one in Fort Worth shortly.

All members of last season have been retained for 1922, with the exception of Paul Bennett, who was sold to the National League.

Tubercular Deaths Total 100,000.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 28.—Deaths from tuberculosis in the "registration area" of the United States during 1920 totalled nearly 100,000, the census bureau announced today, estimating the mortality from this one cause in the entire country at 122,000. This would indicate a reduction of 10,000 from the total of the previous year, it was said. The trend of tuberculosis death rate is downward.
