Last year the new director was pitcher for the Cincinnati Reds and had excellent prospects in the professional phase of the National game, but he states that he sees a great field in athletic direction for educational institutions, and this has inspired him to make the change.

The attitude of Mr. Douglas in connection with the work with the Amarillo High School is of such character as to convince those with whom he has talked, that he has the utmost confidence in his ability to lead the local boys to an excellent showing in their work on the athletic field. The new director is to take up his duties without delay and will begin shaping his forces for the opening of the baseball season.

ELKS LODGE TO DISCUSS ITS PART IN CIVIC AFFAIRS AT ITS REGULAR MEETING MONDAY NIGHT, JAN. 23

Amarillo Elks Lodge No. 925, B. P. O. Elks, is making plans to take an active part in civic affairs of the city. This action is being taken because of the wish of the grand exalted ruler that local lodges become a more vital factor in local affairs.

A few weeks ago T. C. Ward, exalted ruler, appointed a special committee consisting of Ura Embry, J. N. Biggs and Allen Early, chairman, to make recommendations to the local lodge. The report of this committee will be discussed at the regular meeting Monday night, and officers are anxious that every member of the lodge be present. The report addressed to Secretary E. L. Otto follows:

"Your communication of December 1921, addressed to Brothers Ura Embry, J. N. Biggs and Allen Early was duly received. We have been waiting until after the Christmas activities to call a meeting of our committee.

"I am pleased to report that our committee met and accepted the appointment. You will readily realize that we three can do no much work alone and to do this work efficiently we must have the assistance and co-operation of all brother Elks that are interested. The work assigned us by the Grand Lodge is divided into the following divisions:

"Big brother movement, raising of the fallen boy, girl, man or woman, care of neglected youngsters from 8 to 18, investigation of unsanitary housing conditions, aid to crippled and crippled children, general relief to needy. Boy Scouts co-operate with playground superintendents, look to law and order, juvenile courts, hospitals, first offenders, get jobs for boys, Flag Day exercises, etc., and Americanization, the keynote of all our efforts.

"You will quickly see that this work embraces a very broad scope and in order to conduct it in a creditable manner to the Elks, we must have the assistance of all Elks. It is our request, therefore, that if any brother knows of any case that needs attention that he communicate with any one of us, and we will investigate, give the proper at-

tention and make report of recommendations to the lodge. We know there is a great field for this work and it will be our pleasure to render what good we can."

"We expect to make certain recommendations Monday evening next. In the meantime we will be glad to receive suggestions from lodge members."
