FARM EXPERTS TO AID SORGHUM GROWERS BUREAU

Grain sorghum growers, federal and state agricultural experts from Texas and New Mexico, county agents, Texas and New Mexico Farm Bureau Federation officers and members, bankers, farmers' cooperative commodity marketing association officers and organizers, chambers of commerce representatives, railroad agricultural and traffic men, elevator operators, state and federal agricultural experiment station experts, marketing experts and many others will participate in the meeting of the advisory committee of experts of the Texas Grain Sorghum Growers association, according to an announcement made Saturday afternoon by D. P. McCallib, Amarillo, Panhandle Plains Supervisor of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation and director of organization for the newest farm bureau marketing association.

The advisory committee will meet Friday morning, July 14, at 10 o'clock at the City Hall, at which time the purposes for which the committee has been appointed will be explained. The committee then will be divided into sub-committees for the studying of problems pertaining to production, warehousing, marketing, shipping, financing and other features pertaining to the handling of sorghum, milo, foxtails, bigara and other grain sorghum.

Mr. McCallib stated that acceptances had been received from many experts and that the meeting would undoubtedly be one of the most important ever held in Texas. It is the first meeting ever held in which the grain sorghum growers have secured the assistance of representatives of other successful business organizations in the solution of their problems. It is a new step in cooperation between the farmers and their business friends in the other industries he said.

The different sub-committees will enter into their work of planning ways and means of solving grain sorghum problems at their afternoon meeting Friday, Saturday afternoon, July 15, at one thirty o'clock the different sub-committees will report to a general meeting of grain sorghum growers at the City Hall. This meeting will have representatives from most of the big grain sorghum growing counties in Texas and some counties in New Mexico and Oklahoma. Mr. McCallib stated he said that a general invitation has been extended, as usual by farm bureau meetings, to the general public to attend its meetings here, and that it is expected that the response will be larger than ever before at meetings held here by the farm bureau, despite the fact that many farmers are busy in the harvest fields.




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LIONS TO HAVE GOOD PROGRAM ON TUESDAY


