BEEF STEERS HIGHER, RECEIPTS ARE FAIR

CHICAGO, July 14.—Cattle receipts 4500; beef steers mostly steady. Top matured steers \$10.35; yearlings \$10.30; bulk beef steers \$8.85@9.75; she-stock uneven; canner's best beef offerings steady; in-between grades weak to lower; butcher cows and heifers mostly \$5.50@7.25; bulls steady to easy, calves steady to outsiders; week to 25c lower to packers; bulk around \$9.25@9.75; few best at \$10.00; stockers unchanged. Hogs, receipts, 27,000; opened 10 to 15c lower on better grades; closed 20 to 30c lower than yesterday's average; others 25 to 50c down; top \$10.80; few sorted light; good butchers mostly \$10.20 to \$10.65; bulk packing cows \$8.00@8.50; pigs weak to 25c lower; mostly \$9.50@10.00; holdover liberal.

Sheep—receipts 13,000; strong 25c higher; top native lambs \$13.85 to city butchers; good natives largely \$12.50; short sorted and straight cuts mostly \$8.00; feeder ends \$13.00@13.25; best fat handy native ewes \$8.00.

SOME CLASSES OF LIVE STOCK ACTIVE

PORT WORTH, July 14.—No special activity was shown in the cattle market Friday, but some classes sold to a fairly decent demand and the general trend of prices was steady.

Around 2,000 head of cattle and 1500 calves were available. Some fairly good South Texas steers sold around \$5.50, good South Texas calves brought \$6.00 and a car of choice native yearlings, the best here recently brought \$9.60.

Buyers took off another 250 place in the hog yards, the packer top being \$10.25 and the bulk of sales around \$10 to \$10.20. A shipper paid \$10.35 for one car. Pigs were generally lower, the best butcher pigs selling at \$9 and some stockers reached the same money. Hog receipts were close to 1000 head.

Steady prices were paid in the sheep house. Only 500 head were yarded. Quality was ordinary.

Sugar Irregular.

COTTON OPENS LOWER BUT CLOSSES STRONGER

NEW YORK, July 14.—An opening decline in the cotton market was followed by rather sharp rallies on bullish crop advices, but after selling up from \$22.43 to 22.60 for October the market broke again, closing at 22.46. The general market closed easy at a net decline of 19 to 27 points.

Early offerings seemed to be pretty well absorbed on a decline to 22.25 for December and 21.97 for January or about 28 points below yesterday's closing quotations. The market then rallied.

RUST WAVE LOSING GRAIN SCORES RISE

CHICAGO, Ill., July 14.—Better prospects for escape from blackrust had much to do today with bringing about price declines in the wheat market. The close was weak 1¢ to 1 5/8¢ net lower. September \$1.13 3/4 to \$1.13 7/8, and December \$1.16 1/8 to \$1.16 1/4. Corn finished a shade off to 1¢ up, oats 4¢ to 3 1/2¢ down, and provisions varying from a setback of 10¢ to a rise of 2 1/2¢.

OIL SALES HEAVY; SOME ISSUES GAIN

NEW YORK, July 14.—Selling of foreign oils, especially the Mexican division, was resumed in fairly large volume at the opening of today's stock market. Mexican Petroleum soon showed a loss of 2 1/4 points. Independent Steels, chemicals and several of the motors were lower by fractions to one point but rails were not perceptibly depressed by latest aspects of the stock situation. Peoples Gas was conspicuous among the utilities for its two point gain and Central Leather, Coca Cola and Famous Players were moderately higher. Foreign exchanges were steady and a continuance of yesterday's easy money rates was expected.

Cotton Seed Oil.

NEW YORK, July 14.—Cotton seed oil was quiet, with prices easier through scattered selling on dull trade demand and with poor showing in cotton and hog products. Closing bids were 7 to 17 points net lower. Sales 7100 barrels. Prime crude, nominal. Prime summer yellow spot and July 10.80; September 10.25.

Dry Goods Stronger.

NEW YORK, July 14.—The cotton goods market was stronger today with a better demand for odd sizes. Wool goods were firm, raw wool prices unchanged with a fair demand and bur-lays quiet. The broad silk market was strong with a brisk demand for sport silks. Cotton yarns were higher in the knitting division.
