POTTER COUNTY REST ROOM OPEN TO WOMEN  
VISITORS DURING BIG CONVENTION THIS WEEK

In the early part of March 1921, an article appeared in the Daily News from Judge Ray C. Johnson, calling attention of the public to the necessity for a rest room. A representative of the Potter County Federation of Women's Clubs and also the chair of community service of the Polk Street Methodist Church appeared before the commissioners, offering the support of many interested women. The result was the merging of plans for a county library and rest room. The lower floor is to be used for a rest room and assembly hall. These plans were pushed out with the commissioners by Mrs. R. B. Masterson, Jr., and

Mrs. F. T. Collins. The building was completed and the rest room opened to the public July 1.

Green Bros., The Home Beautiful and other interested friends who realized the necessity of rest room quarters for the comfort of patrons and tourists have aided materially in furnishing them. The matron's salary is another expression of the business men.

The board that manages the rest room affairs represents the business, county and city women, as well as those at large, and is composed of the following: Mrs. R. B. Masterson, Mrs. F. T. Collins, Mrs. G. T. Vinyard, Mrs. J. L.

Scott, Miss Ruby Kirk and Miss Gladys Seewald.

Mrs. Samuel Worth, a good Christian woman, is matron. She has a wide knowledge of the city and is capable of giving strangers information. In addition, she has a knowledge of first aid. Mrs. Worth said that 555 women were in the rest room the last week of August with 19 different states and 69 Texas towns represented. The greatest number in any one day has been 127.

The rest room is really a series of rooms and only those who have visited them can appreciate their comfort and beauty. As a woman enters the la-

ment, she steps into the large living room, comfortably filled with chairs and other equipment, including writing desks and papers.

In addition there is a lunch room, finished in pure white. There is another rest room for babies and women not feeling well so that they may lie down for a while. Addressing room with large tables enables women to comb their hair, brush their clothes and attend to other necessities for the well-dressed woman.

To the north of the rest room is an assembly hall. Meetings of interest may be held there. Miss Anna Bower, home demonstrator, has her office adjoining the assembly hall and is convenient to out of town women who wish to consult with her.

How well the rest room is succeeding may be judged by the following letter from Mrs. W. H. Cole of Ferris, Texas: "Do you remember the Methodist preacher's wife and baby who stopped at your rest room about two weeks ago? Now that we are home again and living our trip over in mind, we remember with gratitude the rest and pleasant companionship found in your charming

rooms. Your town deserves much credit for furnishing such a harbor to strangers as well as citizens. Thank you again for your kindness and hospitality."

The rest room board yesterday assured visiting women to the Panhandle-Plains Chamber of Commerce Convention that they would be welcome to the rest rooms at all hours of the day. Special effort will be made to show all women visitors every courtesy possible Tuesday and Wednesday.
