The Honolulu Rifle Association held their twelfth semi-annual competition yesterday at the Kakaia rifle range. The attendance was very good considering the outside attractions of the day. The weather was not conducive to exceptional scores. Walter E. Wall won the Governor Dominis Cup, the H. R. A. Trophy and the Alden Fruit & Taro Co.'s medal. Mr. Wall has won the above prizes at three different times, so they are his permanently. Mr. C. J. Wall took the Directors' Cup for the third time, and was awarded it. A. C. Wall won the first prize in the Citizens' match, and selected the portrait offered by Marceau, the San Francisco photographer.

H. W. Peck was awarded the Watamano gold medal. C. J. Wall won the E. O. Hall & Son trophy for the first time. F. S. Dodge took the Hawaiian Hardware Co.'s trophy for the first time.
