PUTTING DOWN THE MAINS, BYAUTHORITY.

Work on New Water System Begun Yesterday.

PLANS FOR PUMP ON NEXT STEAMER

Government Will Advertise for Bids for Artesian Wells This Week-Superintendent Rowell Arrives Today to Take Charge-Where Pipes Will Be Laid,

The work of laying the new water mains was begun yesterday morning. A crew of twenty men was set at work near the proposed site of the new pumping station at the corner of Beretania and Alapai streets. The crew will probably be increased in a short time and the pipe laid as rapidly as possible. There is 12,400 feet of 12-inch pipe alone to be put down.

The Honolulu Iron Works Company have the contract for building the power station, and the work on this building will begin as so in as the plans for the pump arrive. These are expected on the next steamer from the Coast and the pump will followin a few weeks.

The Government will advertise in a few days for bids for sinking the two 10-inch artesian wells that are to insure the city from all future danger from water famines. These wells will have a capacity of two and a half million gallons daily, which, with the Makiki reservoirs, will give a water supply of nearly five million gallons, independent of the Nuuanu system.

Twelve-inch pipe will be laid on Beretania street from Alapai street to Emma street. This will connect with the 10-inch main at Nuuanu street. The 8-inch pipe will be laid from Beretania street, down Alapai, down South, and along Queen to Nuuanu street; also, from Beretania and Fort streets to the waterfront, along the water-front to Alakea, and along Alakea to Merchant street. From King and Nuuanu streets 12-inch pipe will be laid to Liliha, then 8-inch from Liliha to the Reform School, to Waller's brewery.

The Government has on hand at Makiki 2800 feet of 8-inch pipe to be used to continue the 8-inch main beyond the Reform School. There is 6500 feet of the 10-inch pipe for Beretania street yet to

Superintendent Rowell is expected today on the Kinau, and will assume active direction of the work on the mains. By the time the mains are completed the pumping station will be completed and the wells driven. Everything will be in readiness to give the city a spendid supply of water long before the next dry season puts in an appearance.


