## IT WAS ARTISTIC Living Pictures and Good Music at Opera House.

## THE HIGH SCHOOL BENEFIT

Some Charming Numbers—Instrumental Solos—Illustrated Poems—Large Audience.

The High School Red Cross Benefit concert at the Opera House last evening was throughout of a character that appealed to the highest intelligence and best culture of the city. The dual effect was very striking.

There were three instrumental solos. Ernest Kaai gave "La Paloma" on the mandolin with fine feeling. The melody was delightful. Miss Needham was accompanist. Dr. Ormond E. Wall is now established here as a violinist. He gave a finished interpretation of a difficult composition and was encored. Miss Wall was was accompanist. Miss A. Gertz fairly excelled herself with a piano solo. The selection was the ever popular "Last Rose of Summer." Miss Gertz was most heartily applauded and was given the highest commendation by the musicians in the audience.

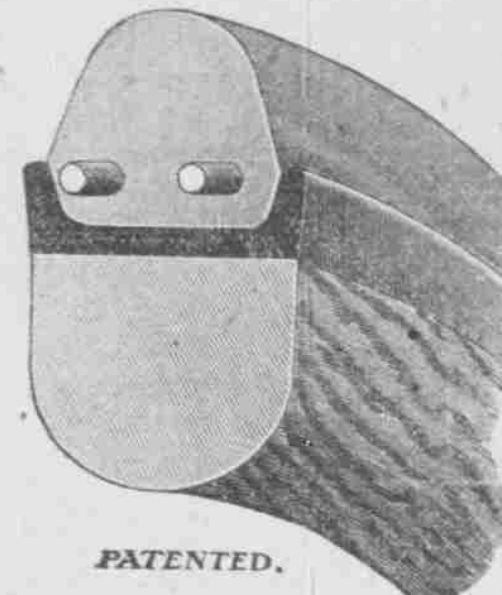
