HOW A BID WAS KILLED

Special Delivery Failed To Work.

HOLIDAY MADE TROUBLE

Territorial Secretary Cooper Explains the Peculiar Delay of a Letter.

SECRETARY of the Territory Henry E. Cooper had an experience yesterday with the recently inaugurated special delivery system of the postoffice department which has been a costly experiment to the sender of a letter with the 10-cent stamp affixed thereon.

The Attorney General's department has lately advertised for bids for supplying certain materials for the department. The tenders were to be opened yesterday at noon, sharp. On Thursday, Thanksgiving day, a bidder dropped his tender in the postoffice, addressed to "Henry E. Cooper, Attorney General," although Mr. Cooper long ago relinquished that office to Mr. E. P. Dole, the present incumbent.

Thanksgiving day being a holiday, the Government offices were closed and the letter could not be delivered. The messenger of the Secretary's office yesterday morning took the mail out of Mr. Cooper's postoffice box and among the letters was a notice that there was a special letter awaiting Mr. Cooper at the registry office. Shortly after noon the messenger took the notice to the postoffice and there received the "Special Delivery" letter. It was turned over to Mr. Dole at 2 o'clock and found to contain a tender for supplies, the award for which had already been made at noon.

"It is a strange thing to me that a special delivery letter should have to go through such a course," said Mr. Cooper. "Of course it could not be delivered to me on Thanksgiving day because the Government offices were closed. It should, however, have been delivered the first thing this morning, when the office was opened at half past eight. It would have been much better in this case if the sender of this letter had placed an ordinary 2-cent stamp on the letter. In that case I would have had it in the forenoon and the bid could have been opened up with the others."

THE 8-HOUR RULE IN EFFECT NOW

Carpenters and Mill Men Will Work Only That Long in Future

Today the eight-hour rule goes into effect as agreed upon between the Carpenters' Union and the Master Builders the first week of last month. By its terms both the carpenters and mill men will have the advantage of the reduction in the working hours. The agreement was a compromise between the two associations. The carpenters several months ago inserted the following notice to the Master Builders in the newspapers:

NOTICE.
To Contractors and Owners—The carpenters of Honolulu, in mass meeting assembled on the 21st day of August, 1900, declared it to be their intention to ask for a reduction of working hours from nine hours a day, as at the present time, to eight hours per day on and after the first day of November, 1900, the pay per day to be the same as it was on August 31, 1900.

By order of the Carpenters' Union.
On Wednesday, October 31, the Master Builders formed an association and at the same time met the demand of the carpenters with a compromise in which it was asked to delay attempting to put the eight-hour rule into effect until January 1. The Carpenters' Union refused to abide by the terms of the compromise offered and walked out.

The matter was brought to a close later by the Carpenters' Union making a counter compromise to have the eight-hour rule go into effect on December 1st, which was promptly accepted by the Master Builders.

Bicycle Parade.

The bicycle parade to be held early this afternoon at St. Andrew's fair is a new departure for Honolulu and one which is most probably destined to be popular. The bicycles of competitors will be tastefully decorated with flowers. The entrance fee is 25 cents and names should be given in early this morning to either Mrs. Kitcat or Mr. L. G. Blackman.

Prizes will be awarded to the winners of each class—one for ladies and another for gentlemen.

At Kawaiahao.

Mrs. Annis Montague Turner will sing "Home, Sweet Home," in Hawaiian and "O Divine Redeemer" in English at the morning jubilee services of Kawaiahao church tomorrow. In the evening service Mrs. Turner will sing "O Holy Night" and "Valley of Shadows," both in English, with accompaniment by Miss Caroline Castle.
