THE PERU'S MAIL.

What the Newspaper World is Talking About

Hon. John W. Foster Honors Us With a Visit—The Dreibund and Its Influence—Cubans and the Turks—Peace and Not War.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 23.—The irades issued yesterday, in connection with the recent purchases of arms, have resulted in a condition of affairs which is regarded as very grave. The Ministers opposed the polltax imposed on Mussulmans, but the palace officials insisted that the measure was necessary for the defense of the Mussulmans religion on the grounds that Christians were preparing to attack Mussulmans, and the European press was preaching a crusade against Islam.

The British Committee appointed to investigate the cause of recent disorders here, computes that 15,000 Armenians at Constantinople and in the suburbs had been rendered destitute as a result of the late massacres.

Danger to the Dreibund.

BERLIN, Oct. 25.—The Bismarckian newspaper organs in their comments upon the marriage of the Prince of Naples, crown Prince of Italy, to Princess Helene of Montenegro, which took place in Rome yesterday, connect the incident with an English intrigue whose object is to isolate Germany and cause the withdrawal of Italy from the Dreibund.

Maximilian Harden, writing to the Zukunft, says that the Dreibund is now only an external semblance of an alliance. Germany, he says, cannot reckon upon her allies, as she knows full well that Russia may at any moment give her assent to the scheme of an enemy (France) frantic for revenge. The Zukunft in its comments upon the communication traces the present position of Germany back to the policy of the Emperor and his Chancellor, General von Caprivi, of disrupting that of Prince Bismarck and endeavoring to conciliate Russia.

The Berliner Tageblatt, criticizing Prince Bismarck's communications to the Hamburger Nachrichten, the ex-Chancellor's personal organ, upon the origin of the entente between Russia and France, charges the Prince with having used his influence to discredit the Government of the Kaiser before the world, and suggests that the time has come when it is imperative that the current disclosures and criticisms adverse to the real interests of Germany should be stopped.

German Sugar Ring.

BERLIN, Oct. 25.—It is reported that a sugar ring is in process of formation, whose membership will consist of 400 German sugar manufacturers. This organization proposes to establish a central point for sale of the product of German sugar manufacturers and negotiations are in progress with a view of connecting the organization with the Austrian and Russian sugar trusts.

The Freisinnige Zeitung, in an article announcing the proposed formation of this ring, says the scheme is a gross outrage, having for its object the exploitation of consumers in an attempt to cement an oppressive German sugar monopoly. The scheme, the Zeitung says, must be suppressed at all hazards.

Turks are Warlike.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 22.—An irade has been issued levying a polltax of 5 piastres per head on all Mussulmans, and increasing the taxes on sheep, public works and education from 1 to 1½ percent. These taxes, with the revenue from five projected monopolies, will, it is estimated, produce 1,200,000 Turkish pounds,

which will be used for military purposes. These military preparations, in connection with the tone of the Turkish press against the Armenians, have excited comment.

Joke of the Czar.

PARIS, Oct. 22.—Grand Duke Vladimir to-day received the following dispatch from the Czar, who is at Darmstadt:

"We are enjoying well earned rest under the hospitable roof of the tyrants of Hesse. NIKI."

A French newspaper asserts this telegram throws valuable light upon the condition of the Czar's spirits, and proves that his brain is not haunted by grave considerations after talking with Emperor William of Germany at Wiesbaden.

LONDON, Oct. 23.—The Marquis of Salisbury has demanded the immediate release of Sun Yat Sen, the Chinese physician said to be a British subject, who was, according to the statement of his friends, kidnapped while passing the Chinese Legation here, and is held a prisoner in the Legation on a charge of having been engaged in a conspiracy to overthrow the Manchu dynasty.

The newspapers continue printing indignant comments on the alleged Chinese kidnapping case.

The Globe says: "The deepest resentment would be felt against any Government which permitted this outrage upon a man who has come to London for protection to go unredressed. The Chinese Embassy must understand that public opinion will not allow a legal action to abrogate protection."

Dr. James Cantlie, who brought the case to the notice of the authorities here, says he knew Sun Yat Sen intimately at Hongkong during 1887. He adds that the Chinaman came to London on his advice to pursue his medical studies, as he was in trouble with the Chinese Government. Dr. Cantlie saw Sun Yat Sen at Honolulu last March, and saw him daily here.

Dr. Cantlie said: "I received information on the 17th that Sun Yat Sen was in prison and about to be sent to China, where he would be beheaded."

WATERFRONT WHISPERS.

The British steamer Egremont Castle, Capt. W. Valentine, arrived at 8 o'clock this morning, 14 days from San Francisco en route to Calcutta with a full load of wheat amounting to 3650 tons. She is consigned to Theo. H. Davies & Co. and has dropped in here for coal. The captain states that he requires about 300 tons. The steamer is anchored in the stream.

The bark S. C. Allen, Capt. Thompson arrived last Saturday afternoon, 14 days from San Francisco, beating her dangerous rival's time, the bkt. Irmgard, by about 12 hours. The Allen brought 4 passengers and a valuable cargo of machinery and merchandise. She commenced to discharge this morning at Allen & Robinson's wharf a deck load of posts and shingles.

The Irmgard is at the Oceanic wharf and has commenced unloading. Capt. Schmidt has Jack Stelling as his delivery clerk.

The Mikahala, Capt. Haglund arriving yesterday morning brought the first lot of Kekaha and Lihue Plantation sugars of the new crop, 3281 sacks. There were 11 cabin passengers and 48 deck.

The Waialeale arrived yesterday from the Garden Island with 858 bags paddy and 408 bags of rice.

The Likelike has again be brought into service in the Wilder line. She left her old haunts at the fishmarket this morning, and has been put in command of Capt. Nye, late of the steamer Lehua. The Likelike leaves for Hawaii to-morrow afternoon.

The O. C. & N. Co. steamer Arago Capt. Reed, was wrecked off Coos Bay on Oct. 20th with the loss of 14 lives. The captain and ship's officers were among the saved.
