ITEMS OF INTEREST.

Gathered From All Quarters of the Globe.

With a combination of locks and springs, M. Leguir, Frenchman, has made a bicycle which, if it will not absolutely go into pocket, may be guarded from the tender mercies of the average porter by being put in an ordinary trunk. It is not a toy, but a full-sized machine.

A banker at Adrian, Mich., who is troubled with an irritable temper, keeps a barn full of cats, and when he gets out of sorts he goes out, grabs up a cat and cuts its head off with an ax. His wife doesn't approve of the habit, but is afraid to break him of it.

The last State lottery in England was drawn on October 18, 1826, and in the same year lotteries were declared illegal by an act of Parliament.

That old story about the island of Juan Fernandez having disappeared, which was published in a New York paper over a year ago and subsequently reprinted by a local publication, is revived. The Chilean Government reported some time ago that there is no truth in the reported sinking of the island, and there is no excuse for the republication of the fake here.

Italy has 48 percent illiterate people; France and Belgium 15 percent. In Hungary the illiterates number 43 percent, in Austria 39 percent and in Ireland 21 percent. In India only 11,000,000 out of 250,000,000 can read and write.

One of the largest bull mooses ever secured was shot recently in Maine. The animal weighed 1200 pounds and stood 7 feet high from the ground to the top of his withers, measuring 10 feet from the tip of his nose to tail. Its head was crowned by a set of antlers with a spread of 50 inches.

A new instrument called the phonoscope, enables the skillful medical man to hear the sounds emitted by all the organs in the human body—the heart, the lungs, the liver, etc.—and discover if they are in a healthy condition or otherwise.

A wealthy Englishman, who recently died in Vienna, had a fad for collecting uniform buttons, the teeth of wild beasts and the fans of beautiful women. His collection comprised 352 fans, 20,000 buttons and about two bushels of animals' teeth.

In the British Museum, London, the museum of the Academy of Science at Paris, the National Museum at Vienna, and in the several institutions for the advancement of science, there may be seen specimens of birds' eggs which are almost as large as a two-gallon jug. These eggs were laid by the epiornis, an extinct and gigantic bird of Madagascar.

Wanted a Tree.

A wealthy resident of North Broad street, formerly prominent in commercial circles, says the Philadelphia "Record," entered the establishment of an Eleventh-street florist and remarked impressively: "Say, young man, I want a couple of these yere gen'alogical trees set out in my front yard right away. A Marvelous Trick.

A French scientist, M. Ragonneau, says he has duplicated the Hindoo trick of growing a plant from seed in thirty minutes. The Hindoos use earth from ant hills that is saturated with formic acid and greatly stimulates the germination of the seed. By infusing ants in boiling water acid as strong as vinegar can be obtained. M. Ragonneau has achieved the best results and most perfect growth by using earth moistened with a solution of 5000 parts of water to one of acid.—S. F. Bulletin.
