**Vagaries on Molokai.**

ED. THE INDEPENDENT:—

On Saturday morning, May 21, 1898, Mr. W. J. Feary, Acting Superintendent Leper Settlement, left the Leper Settlement with four kokuas and two other lepers besides himself in a canoe as paddlers for the valleys of Pelekunu and Waiau on this Island in search of pai-ai for the uses of the inmates of this Asylum. They were away for about a week and on Friday forenoon, May 27, 1898, Mr. Feary and party returned on the Mokoli with about 740 pai-ai from Pelekunu and Waiau, and were landed with the pai-ai at Waikolu. With them came four men from Waiau. These men returned to their homes on the following morning (having spent the night in the Settlement) in a canoe of their own which they had brought along with them taking away from here lots of stuff probably with permission of the Board of Health. It is said on good authority that Mr. W. J. Feary paid for the pai-ai which he brought with him expecting the Board of Health to reimburse him for the outlay. Is it legal and can anyone lay out his own money in food supplies for a public institution? Will the Board of Health approve it? Let the public answer. On account of Mr. W. J. Feary's breaking the law and rules of the Board of Health governing the Leper Settlement the hangers-on have drawn up a petition (probably sanctioned) to the Board of Health praying that Mr. Feary be pardoned and it is being carried around to get the lepers to sign to the same; some of them I dare say are so blind and foolish to sign such a petition holding themselves responsible for an act voluntarily committed by the Acting Superintendent of the Leper Settlement and making it appear that undue influence had been brought to bear on Mr. W. J. Feary by the people which is not a fact. What the Board of Health will do and say of the acts of Mr. Feary, remains to be seen.
