**A Free School.**

A two story schoolhouse is being erected on the premises recently incorporated in the St. Louis College property, by Lucas Bros.

A very handsome and serviceable schoolhouse is being built, and it will be used in the future as a free school adjunct to the college. The Bishop of Panopolia has realized the necessity of increasing the capacity of the school under his protection. The seating capacity of the present school buildings is taxed to the utmost, and children seeking admission to the college are daily turned away.

The college charges a very small tuition fee, but there are yet a number of people unable to pay the trifles demanded by the school. To give the children of the poor a chance to receive the excellent advantages offered by the St. Louis school it was decided to erect and conduct free school, where those really in need and in poor circumstances can have their children taught.

Mr. Lucas, the contractor, expects to deliver the new building on the 15th of December, and Brother Bertram, the principal of St. Louis College, expects to open the new school after the Christmas vacation. The new school will have room for about 250 children, but at present that number will not be admitted. More teachers are needed and a requisition for them has been made to the headquarters of St. Louis in the United States.

**Another Assault.**

Ah Heong, a Chinese hackdriver charged with using his whip on a small native boy was sent to the reef for ten days by Judge Wilcox. The defendant claimed that the boy had struck his horse, but the judge held that no end of trouble would arise, if every man took the law in his own hand. "The boy whipped your horse," said the judge in sentencing the culprit, "you whipped the boy, the big brother of the boy might have whipped you within an inch of your life, and your clan then done up the big brother, and the police been forced to fight the clan. If these assault cases are permitted to go on unchecked I do not see where we will end." The Chinaman didn't approve of the views of the judge and noted an appeal.
