Sampson's Last Rest.

Washington, May 6.—Rear Admiral William T. Sampson, retired, died at his home in this city at 5 o'clock this afternoon. The immediate cause of death was a severe cerebral hemorrhage. He had been in a semi-conscious state for several days. At the bedside when the Admiral breathed his last were Mrs. Sampson, Mrs. Lieutenant Cluverius, the Admiral's married daughter; Admiral Sampson's two young sons, Ralph and Harold Sampson; Dr. Dixon, the attending physician, and nurses and attendants.

Mrs. Sampson has broken down under the severe strain and was quite ill all during the day. But for the critical condition of the Admiral she would have been confined to her bed.

Washington, May 9.—With a pomp and circumstance exceeding that of any naval funeral in this country in recent years, at least, the remains of William T. Sampson, Rear Admiral in the United States Navy, and commander-in-chief of the United States naval forces on the North Atlantic station, during the war with Spain, were today laid at rest. Every department of the National Government was represented. The military and naval features of the ceremonies were brilliant and impressive. They were conducted under direction of Rear Admiral Terry, commandant of the Washington Navyyard, assisted by Lieutenant Henry George, the adjutant general.

The funeral escort was composed of the light battery of United States Artillery, commanded by Captain Foote and drawn from Fort Myer; the naval cadets from Annapolis, 247 strong, a corps that never has paraded in Washington before save on several occasions when a President was to be inaugurated; a battalion of bluejackets from the North Atlantic squadron, of which Rear Admiral Sampson was formerly commander.

Holland's Queen in Danger.

The Hague, May 5.—It was announced from Castle Loo at midnight last night that Queen Wilhelmina had been prematurely confined at 6 o'clock Sunday evening. Professor Rosenstein, Dr. Roessings and the other doctors were in attendance. The Queen suffered intense agony.

At 11 o'clock Sunday evening the condition of Her Majesty was described as critical, and small hope for her recovery was entertained.

A message from Castle Loo, sent at 7 o'clock this morning, says Queen Wilhelmina is still alive. None of the doctors attending Her Majesty left the palace last night, and neither the Queen's mother nor the Prince consort went to bed.

The confinement of the Queen was long and difficult and artificial means were resorted to.

The Hague, May 5.—"It is a disappointment, but the Queen is saved." Such is the general feeling regarding the sad event of yesterday evening. The extreme seriousness of Her Majesty's illness was closely connected with the acute infectious malady from which she was convalescing, and this complication involved imminent danger of her death.

The Hague, May 7.—Advices received here from Castle Loo, dated 1 o'clock this morning, declare that Queen Wilhelmina's condition again excites grave anxiety. Another consultation of the Queen's doctors was held at 11 o'clock last night. The result of this consultation is not known.

President Sam Resigns.

Port Au Prince, Hayti, May 8.—General Tiresias Simon Sam, President of the Haytien Republic, has resigned his office.

The Haytien Congress will assemble May 12 to select his successor. The Haytien Republic is completely calm.

Former President Jimenez of Santo Domingo has embarked on board a French steamer and is expected here.

General Deschamps, the former Governor of Puerto Plata, Santo Domingo, the last place to surrender to the Dominican revolutionists, who also embarked on a French steamer, has sought refuge at Cape Haytien, Hayti.

President Sam was elected April 1, 1896, for seven years.
