Treasurer Kepoikai is preparing the form of the bonds authorized by the Legislature.

The Columbia saloon has again reduced the price of drinks, this time to ten cents to meet the figure of the Pantheon.

Secretary Carter's office was besieged by Chinamen all of the forenoon, in quest of their deposits in the Postal Savings bank.

The Punahou defeated the Kamehameha in the junior baseball series yesterday, winning the championship for the season.

The Territorial Teachers Association talked of "temperance" at the meeting held last evening. Dr E C Waterhouse was the principal speaker.

On account of having to wait to transfer recruits to the Battleship Wisconsin, the Iroquois will not sail until May 29 for Midway Islands.

D Howard Hitchcock, the well known Hawaiian artist, and family expect to leave in a few months for New York to be away two or three years.

The application of Albert K. Nawahi for a retail liquor license at Poho, Puna, Hawaii, has been approved by Governor Dole and his council.

Some men of the Yorktown were ashore today but usual liberty will not be given until the vessel has finished coaling, which will be about Thursday.

J M Monsarrat and P L Weaver are rival candidates for the position of judge on the Torren's land law commission. Both have many supporters.

The remains of the late Mrs F H Hayselden were taken by the Kinau today to Lahaina for interment, accompanied by all the members of the family.

Treasury Agent McLeenan is in the Queen's hospital and is quite a sick man. Collector E R Stackable will act for him in fire claims matters until his recovery.

"Woman against Woman," which attracted so many people to the Orpheum last evening, will be the bill at the same place tonight. It is a fine play and is splendidly staged.

"Savings Banks in the Schools" will be the subject of an address to be delivered by Rev Alexander Mackintosh before the W C T U in Central Union church at 2:30 this afternoon.

Charles Elston defeated W P Roth in the final tennis contest yesterday, thereby again becoming the champion of the Islands. Roth proved out of form and was badly beaten by his opponent.

Mrs John N Wright has petitioned the court for the appointment of Fred Wundenberg as a third executor of her late husband's will in place of W H Wright, who is absent from the country.

The Supreme Court has denied a new hearing in the case of Mrs Aona Geriz against J A Magoon, and the petitioner will now take her troubles to the United States Court of Appeals in California.

An Kong, a Chinese fruiterer, struck George Kelo in the face with a hammer last night breaking his nose. The Chinaman called at the native's residence in Makiki to collect a bill, and the assault was the result of the interview. Ah Kong was arrested.

**IN EXTRA SESSION.**

The Second Legislature for the Consideration of Appropriation Bills.

**THE SENATE—SEVENTEENTH DAY.**

Met pursuant to adjournment, the regular routine business being disposed of in the usual manner.

Cecil Brown, from Printing committee, reported House Bill 3, the Six Months Current Expense Account, as having been printed and ready.

Kaohi submitted a letter he received from the Secretary of the Board of Health, transmitting copies of letters from Dr J Atcherley, the Government Physician for South Kohala, in which the doctor asks for an increase of pay. The letter says that "the Board of Health are aware of the necessity of a larger salary for the physician for South Kohala, and have recommended such an increase in the appropriation estimates now before the Legislature. In reference to the back pay requested by Dr Atcherley, this is a matter for legislative action." Tabled for consideration with the Appropriation Bill. The present salary is \$50 a month and the increase asked for is to make it \$100 a month.

House Bill 3 was then taken up for consideration on second reading. A new item was inserted, on motion of McCandless, before beginning the itemized amounts of current expenses, under the head of the "Governor's office, incidentals, \$750"

An attempt was made by Paris to strike out the item of "purchasing and installing 50 Ganswell police call boxes, \$10,000," but it failed. The item "Hawaiian Fertilizer Co, refund of merchandise licenses illegally collected, \$1 776 36" was struck out on motion of Cecil Brown, he holding that this would open the door for other like claims to come in.

Various other items were struck out, and some increased to amounts already passed by the Senate.

The "Honolulu Park Commission" item passed at \$6,000 instead of \$3,600 and the proviso "that no admission fee shall be charged for admittance to any horse races, etc., was struck out. A new item for "one artesian well and pipe, \$7,500" was inserted on motion of Isenberg, although Achi attempted to reduce it to \$5,000. Another new item for "Government Pounds and maintenance, \$250" was inserted on motion of Achi.

The item "Repairs Waianae Court House" was amended by adding "or new Court House, \$1,000," as was also the following item "repairs jail and cottage, Waianae" by adding "or new jail and cottage, \$1,000."

"Running expenses sewer pumping station" was increased to \$6,500 instead of \$2,640, as was also the item "running expenses pumping plants [3]" to \$12,500 instead of \$11,690.

"Waianae Water Works" item of \$1,000 was struck out as also the item "equipment and maintenance of combination Chemical and Horse Wagon" for Waimea, Kauai, on motion of Kalaoukalani, because Baldwin objected to it, he holding that there several places on Maui that would need it just as well if Waimea should get one.

An item "Aala Park, \$625" was inserted, and the "Rock Crusher" item for Kau was amended by adding "Kau and South Kona, \$2,500." Also another insertion was made for the "Pali Road, Nuuanu, Koolau side, \$2,000" under the Koolau-poko sub-head. Under Ewa and Waianae, "Roads and Bridges, General, \$12,500" was inserted as also "Road to new Cemetery, Kalihi, \$1,000" and "Kunawai Lane, \$500." And under Koloa, another item was inserted "new bridge, Lawai Valley, \$3,500 on motion of Isenberg.

"Furniture and fixtures" under Department of Public Instruction was reduced to \$2,000, and "expenses installing Kindergarten, \$250" was inserted on Dickey's motion. "Fencing, engine, piping and reservoir, Boys Industrial School, \$4,500"

was inserted on Cecil Brown's motion.

On the items under the Board of Health, relative to the Kalaupapa Store and the Provisions and Ration Supplies, as well as the segregation and medical treatment, a discussion was aroused. Achi believed in lumping the whole into one, as it would cripple the Board, but Baldwin believed in the apportionment as made by the House. Nothing definite was decided upon when recess was taken at noon.

**New Board Meets.**

The new board of forestry and agriculture met yesterday afternoon and perfected organization. L A Thurston was chosen president and Superintendent H E Cooper was made secretary.

It was decided to grant Prof Koebele a vacation of two months, on account of impaired health, after which time he will be sent to Australia in search of a destroyer for the leaf hopper pest. An assistant entomologist will be provided to accompany him on this important mission.

Prof Pinchot, head of the national forestry bureau, will be asked to select a competent head for the forestry department.

Before adjourning the Board decided to hold its meetings every Wednesday afternoon.

**Won't Go to Hilo.**

The Elleford Company will not go to Hilo. W H Crawford had made all arrangements to take the troupe, and the management of the company was agreeable to the trip, but manager Cohen, of the Orpheum has put a veto on the proposition. It seems that when the Ellefords signed for the Islands they agreed not to play anywhere in the group except at the Orpheum. Mr Cohen is holding them to this agreement.

**Y M C A Leaders.**

A party of Y M C A workers, most of whom are leaders of the American Associations, with headquarters in New York, arrived by the Ventura this morning and will spend several days in the Islands. On Thursday evening a reception will be tendered them in the Y M C A hall, beginning with a supper at 6 o'clock under the auspices of the Life Problem Club.
