AGITATION.

Agitation is to reform what planting, sowing and cultivating the land are to the harvest season. The conditions necessary to success are very much the same in both cases. Like the putting in of seed, agitation must be timely, otherwise it will result only in loss of means and the throwing away of force. It is essential also that it be conducted by those who understand the processes to be followed, or, in other words, who have mastered the "know how." The absence of these requisites and many more that might be enumerated in the agitations of this insular community is what has retarded progress and left improvement unprovided for. Popular utterances have found expression only in a desultory manner. A sort of guerilla warfare goes on against public abuses, but no organized plan of campaign has ever been adopted, much less followed. Needed reforms in public affairs fail of being achieved, not because they are beyond the reach of the people, but because the people have failed to take the only steps that have ever proved useful to give effect to their wishes. All that has been done to prepare the soil and to deposit the seed for a crop of reform has been the breaking of the crust of official transactions and unearthing a few scandals, and scattering opinions about in a pell mell sort of fashion. This is not the way the agriculturist secures rewards of his labors. And if the comparison holds good, it may be set down as a dead certainty that, if their methods remain in the present loose-ends condition, those who are earnestly desirous of realizing even moderate returns of national development in Hawaii will continue to flow on to the end of the chapter. As soon as the agitation already afoot is well organized and skillfully conducted, results may be counted on; hitherto they have been at the full value of nothing.

THIRD JUDICIAL CIRCUIT.

May Term, 1887.

The above Court opened at Hilo, Hawaii, May 4th, at 1 p. m., Chief Justice Judd presiding. Present: Circuit Judge Lyman; Daniel Porter, clerk; Marshal Kaulouku and Sheriff Baker; A. P. Peterson, Deputy Attorney General; H. L. Holstein, Hawaiian interpreter; Attorneys V. V. Ashford, W. A. Kinney, C. Creighton and D. H. Hitchcock. Prior to mailing of report the following cases had been disposed of:—

- Paulo (k.), found guilty of manslaughter third degree and sentenced to five years' imprisonment at hard labor.
- Kaumai (k.), larceny of a horse; verdict guilty; sentenced to one year at hard labor.
- Wahineaukai (k.), burglary; verdict guilty; sentenced to one year at hard labor.
- Jas. Shaw, J. F. Jordan and Manuel Luig, Sabbath breaking; verdict not guilty.
- Ah Wa Fook, distilling spirits; verdict not guilty, three dissenting.
- Amo, selling spirituous liquor without license; verdict guilty; fined \$150 and costs.
- John Kane vs. Hilo Sugar Co., trespass; verdict for plaintiff, \$408.33.
- Kiha vs. Jas. Kaai, assumpsit; verdict for plaintiff, \$231.
- Setepano vs. J. B. Acaie, assumpsit; jury waived; judgment for plaintiff, \$54.75 and interest.
- Moae (k.), distilling spirits; no appeal perfected.
- Kaaiwai (k.), malicious injury; continued to next term.
- Kawahinekuilei and Kanoe vs. Kawahine and Kawahine, suit to recover a horse; appeal withdrawn.
- Estate D. Kaawa (k.); deceased intestate; sent back to Probate Court for administration.
- Ako, opium in possession; fine paid.
