



FEDERAL TROOPS IN IDAHO. [New York Mail and Express] presence of federal troops in Shoshone county, in that state, which is emi-nently creditable to his judgment and

It will be remembered that a serious riot, instigated by striking miners, occurred in Shoshone county last April, which resulted in the loss of two lives and property valued at up-ward of \$250,000. Nearly 100 of the men were subsequently arrested, and when themselves unable to guard the prisoners and maintain law and order an

appeal was made to the federal government for assistance. Troops were thereupon sent into the county, where they have since remained, rendering effective protection to life and property. The arrival of these troops in Idaho was instantly met with a howl of protest from certain democrats, populists

and other demagogues, who denounced the proceeding as a military oppression of organized labor by a republican ad-ministration. This senseless clamor has continued with increasing violence in spite of the fact that the troops were sent in response to an urgent request from a democratic governor, but now the latter comes forward with a statement which exposes the whole noisy crowd of slanderers in their true colors The secretary of war in a recent letter to Gov. Steunenberg signified a desire to withdraw these troops from Idaho, and suggested that the state authori-ties take charge of the prisoners and
