BRIEF NEWS NOTATION.

The commissioner of patents granted 23,279 during the year.

A bursting emery wheel killed Henry P. Ware, 25, at Paducah.

The wife of Senator Thurston, of Nebraska, died aboard of a ship at Cuba. Mrs. John Mason Brown, widow of the distinguished lawyer, died at Louisville.

The Clark county grand jury found 90 indictments against Winchester blind tigers.

Charles Rudolph, who leased the Bijou at Louisville, has skipped, taking with him a pretty girl of that city.

Twenty widows are on the steamer New England, en route to Alaska, where they propose to open groceries.

William J. Koerner, the newspaper artist, who killed his sweetheart, was sentenced at New York to life imprisonment.

At Jackson, Rev. Charles Robbins and three others have been convicted of kukuizing and sentenced to one year's imprisonment.

"Molly," the 6 foot 10 inch Negro porter at the Hotel Southern, Mayfield, is dead. He wore a No. 15 shoe and was mammoth in every way.

Squire W. F. McNamara killed John Keller at Lexington. There were no witnesses, but the squire says that Keller attacked him with a knife.

The Victor Woollen Mills, the largest in the United States, burned at Cohees, N. Y., causing a loss of \$400,000 and throwing 1,000 men out of work.

Lightning struck the "Cannon Ball" train on the Illinois Central, between Mayfield and Dyersburg, breaking four windows and frightening the passengers.

John C. Breckinridge Corp of Confederate Veterans will bring the mother of the great partisan soldier, Quantrell, to Lexington and supply her a home.

The towboat Rescue met with a series of accidents on her way from Pittsburg to Cincinnati. Six boats and several flats with about 150,000 bushels of coal were sunk.

Dennis J. Canty, formerly a partner with H. W. Van Senden in the stock brokerage business, shot and killed a Western speculator at Washington. The members of this firm seem to be unlucky in every particular.

John Stephenson, the Negro who shot Deputy Sheriff Logan Young in Jessamine and was given five years, appealed and the court of appeals reversed the case on technical grounds. Monday he was again tried and pleading guilty was again given five years, after lying in jail 18 months.

Glasgow will have a sale of Negro vagrants in a few days.

An Illinois University has added dancing to its curriculum.

Raiders blew up a toll-house in Montgomery with dynamite, but there was no one in it.

Charles Boyes, his wife and 12-year-old child were killed by lightning at Allensville.

Dr. Daniel J. Gist, who had been a practicing physician for 60 years, is dead at Hopkinsville.

The Jennie Casseday Infirmary at Louisville, has been sold to Dr. Louis McMurtry for \$15,000.

A performing elephant belonging to Gentry Bros', circus broke its leg during the show at New Albany, Ind.

The Louisville Board of Trade will keep "open house" at Old Point Comfort after the Kentucky launching.

In a fit of jealousy Albert Lathwell, of Niagara Falls, shot his wife, his mistress and himself. All will die.

Despondency over ill health caused Miss Chloe Shrewsbury, of Montgomery, W. Va., to end her life with a pistol.

Miss Kate McManus, of Upper Sandusky, O., took carbolic acid to quiet an aching tooth and died a few moments later.

Erwin K. Maxwell, an old hotel man and the father of Walter Maxwell, of the Palace Hotel, Cincinnati, is dead in that city.

A new corporation filed articles with the secretary of State, the American Cholera Vaccine Company, of Louisville. Capital stock \$10,000. The incorporators are John B. Castleman, Wilbur Lewis and Frank Elsmann.

The worst fire that has occurred in Chicago since the Cold Storage warehouse holocaust at the World's Fair, in 1893, broke out in the building at the corner of Wabash Avenue and Jackson boulevard, causing the deaths of 20 people, several of whom were killed by jumping out of third story windows.

Failing to win the heart and hand of a London, O., girl, John Withers began to drink. During a spree he stole a watch from a saloon keeper and now he is serving a five years' sentence in the penitentiary, where the young lady frequently visits him. They will marry when his term expires.

Mrs. Hallie Miller, whose maiden name was Harper and said to be from Danville, died in Lexington, where she was deserted by her husband of three weeks. She was but 16 years old.

A Western cattle grower says that saturating the hair on the backs of cattle with weak brine during the months of February and March will kill every grub of the ox warble in their hides.

NEW CIGARETTE LAW.

WHICH WILL GO INTO EFFECT JUNE 13.

"Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Kentucky:

"First—It shall be unlawful for any person to sell, barter or loan or give, to make, fabricate or manufacture, to have on his premises, in his possession or under his control, a cigarette whether made by hand or manufactured, whether it be made of tobacco or other substance, whether it be covered with paper or other material, it shall be unlawful for any person to have on his premises, in his possession or under his control, any substance or material out of which any part of such cigarette could be made with the knowledge or purpose that at any time such substance or material might become a factor in such cigarette."

"Second—Any person who shall violate the law as set forth in the first paragraph of this act, or shall evade it by any trick, artifice or method whatever, shall, upon conviction, be fined not less than \$10 nor more than \$100, or imprisonment in the county jail for not less than five nor more than 50 days, or both so fined and imprisoned in the discretion of the jury, and each violation or evasion of law shall be deemed a separate offense."
