SENATOR McCREARY will not reside in Washington, New York or any other metropolitan center after March 4, when his term expires. Some of the reports even take the Senator on a long European trip. The Senator is going back to his old Kentucky home to live among the people he has so faithfully served in his long congressional career. He says: "A few weeks after Congress adjourns I will return to Richmond, Ky., and my residence will be in the State and county and town where I was born and reared, and where I have so often been honored and whose people I love so well. I shall occupy the same home in which I have lived for many years. I am satisfied with my religion, my politics and my home, and I do not desire to change either, and I shall stand ready to help my friends and shall always take an interest in progress, politics and education, and in everything that will advance or benefit Kentucky, to whose people I shall always be grateful for the cordial friendship and the hearty support extended to me for many years."

The editor of the Glasgow Times predicts that Judge O'Rear, of the court of appeals, will be the next republican candidate for governor, and that he will run on a State-wide prohibition platform. This may be true, but it is written in the stars that Kentucky is now enduring her last republican governor. Caleb Powers and assassination generally, have already had too wide a range.

The country breathes easier. The men on the bond of Beach Hargis, who is charged with the murder of his father, Judge James Hargis, surrendered him to the Breathitt county officers and he was arrested and taken to the jail at Irvine to await his second trial in April. The first trial resulted in a hung jury.

MISS ALICE LLOYD has severed her connection with the Burley Tobacco Association. The association will show itself most ungrateful if it does not substantially reward her. She has done far more than the night riders in bringing about an adjustment of affairs.

A DOZEN or more of Senator W. O. Bradley's Lancaster friends will accompany him to the Capitol City, thinking possibly he might get off at Charlottesville, Alexandria or some other way station and proceed to represent them then and there.

CONGRESS has appropriated \$137,000,000 for the navy, \$103,000,000 for the army and \$160,000,000 for the pensioners. For a peaceful nation this seems to be going some for wars past and scarcely prospective.

It begins to look like every member of the next Legislature will be a candidate for speaker. However, some who are announcing are only talking through their hats to get talked about.

CHICAGO still remains the healthiest American city of more than 350,000 inhabitants, according to the annual report of the Chicago Health Department. Its death rate from all causes is 14.10 per 1,000. The Windy City also carries the pennant for having more big-footed women than any other city on terra firma.

In San Domingo they have a good way of curing an embezzling official. They promptly cut his head off and he never sins again. A fellow appeared \$650,000 behind and he was dead in a few hours. In Kentucky it is the poor devil who steals a pittance that feels the effects of the law.

At any rate Mr. Knox will get \$500 more for being Secretary of State than Senator, which will at least furnish his wife pin money.

POLITICAL.

The South Dakota House passed the Senate equal suffrage bill.

Gov. Marshall, of Indiana, vetoed the bill legalizing Sunday base ball.

Gov. Patterson was introduced as a witness in the Cooper trial at Nashville.

Chris Mueller, of Louisville, who bolted Gov. Beckham for the Senate, died at his home Sunday.

The death of one of their members has left the Republicans without a majority in the Missouri House.

The Broiley bill, legalizing the playing of baseball on Sunday, passed the Indiana Senate by a vote of 30 to 18.

Mayor Tom L. Johnson, of Cleveland, has officially notified the Ohio Supreme Court of his intention to become a lawyer.

It is said that Franklin MacVeagh, of Chicago, has been offered and has accepted the Treasury portfolio tendered by Mr. Taft.

The final week of the Indiana Legislature will see bitter fights on the repeal of the county option law and Sunday baseball bill.

The military academy appropriation bill was reported to the Senate Saturday. It carries \$2,541,421, an addition of \$18,000 over the amount of the bill as it was passed by the House.

J. O. Carter, for many years a prominent figure in the business and political life of the Hawaiian Islands, is dead in Honolulu. He was adviser to Queen Liliuokalani at the time the monarchy was overthrown.

Representative Ollie James, of Kentucky, criticised the passage of the Brownsville bill in the House. He said that President Roosevelt had back-tracked on his original position and that the measure provided a "reward for crime."

The passage of the agricultural appropriation bill by the Senate Friday followed an extended debate on the forestry service, which occupied the entire session. As passed the measure appropriated \$13,075,716, which is an increase of \$191,890 over the bill as passed by the House.

The eight Democratic Senators who Friday broke the quorum in the Tennessee Legislature, and fled to Kentucky to prevent their arrest, have abandoned their intention of returning to Nashville Monday, and say they will remain in Hopkinsville until the General Assembly adjourns. Assistant Sergeant-at-Arms Yeaman arrived here to-day, and is keeping the Senators under strict surveillance. The Senators held a long conference with Gov. Patterson's private secretary and with Austin Penny, his political manager.
