News of Theatres

AMERICANS MUST NOT INTERFERE

IN POLITICAL CONTROVERSIES IN NICARAGUA.

The Neutrality Laws Must Also Be Observed—Revolutionists Growing in Strength.

MANY GOVERNMENT ALLIES

Managua, Jan. 24.—The advance guard of the revolutionary army, 500 strong, engaged the government outposts at La Libertad, 14 miles north of Acopya. The government forces, 1,500 strong, opposed the fire with artillery. The revolutionists replied with long range rifles. They retired after 45 minutes, finding themselves badly outnumbered and lacking artillery. No casualties on the government side.

San Juan Del Sur, Jan. 24.—Admiral Kimball has notified the Americans in Nicaragua to abstain from political controversies and from violation of the laws of neutrality.

The revolutionists have appeared in the mining centers in the department of Chontales. There is great tension throughout the republic on account of conscription orders.

Bluefields, Jan. 24.—Estrada yesterday worked in the day, but must sleep in the barracks.

Arrest Conservatives.

Managua, Jan. 24.—The arrest of Conservatives continues. It is rumored that the steamer Victoria was captured by the revolutionists in Lake Nicaragua. Also that General Vasquez has gone over to the revolutionists. The government declares this absurd.

Battle Expected.

Bluefields, Jan. 24.—Estrada received a telegram from Madrid through Admiral Kimball saying he refuses to recognize the provisional government. This means all peace negotiations are off.

It is believed Madrid's advisers, who are practically the same men who served under Zelaya, are not anxious for peace.

Generals Chamorro, Mena, Zeledon, Masis and Correo, with 4,000 men, are now in the department of Chontales.

There is news that a battle may be expected any time. General Reyes, former governor of the coast provinces who was formerly one of the revolutionists, but turned traitor and sent for Estrada to come to Bluefields to discuss peace and terms, arrived here yesterday, and was immediately arrested and sent to Corn Island, where other political prisoners are held.
