### Driftwood.

The government gauge at 7 o'clock this morning read 3.7 indicating a fall of 0.2 of a foot in the past 24 hours. Weather clear, business good.

The City of Savannah arrived yesterday evening from St. Louis and left at 10 o'clock last night on her way up the Tennessee river.

The Ohio arrived this morning at 11 o'clock from Golconda and left at 2 o'clock on her return trip.

The G. W. Robertson did a splendid business today making her Illinois landings on schedule time.

The Bob Dudley will arrive tomorrow night from Nashville, and will leave Monday at noon for Clarksville.

The J. B. Richardson came back from Brookport last night and is being loaded heavily today. She

leaves this evening at 6 o'clock, for the Tennessee river.

The George Cowling did a good Saturday business in the Metropolis-Paducah trade today arriving this morning at 9 o'clock and leaving at 11, and this afternoon arriving at 2 and departing at 4 o'clock.

There was no packet in the Evansville-Paducah trade today, the next packet will arrive Monday.

Louisville Courier-Journal, Wednesday, says: The officials of the Louisville and Evansville Transportation company were notified yesterday that four dredgeboats have been put to work on the channel between Louisville and Evansville. The stage of water between these two ports is unusually low and the channel is in bad need of being deepened. The dredgeboats will have but little trouble cleaning out the channel, as the snagboat E. A. Woodruff last week pulled 64 snags between Louisville and Evansville. Rivermen are looking forward with interest to the sale of the property of the Pittsburgh and Cincinnati company, which will take place some time next month. It is rumored that St. Louis parties will purchase the two steamers, Queen City and Virginia. Either of the boats would make a splendid excursion boat.

## MONUMENT TO TAFT

SECY. DICKINSON LEAVING MANILA LAUDS PRESIDENT.

War Secretary Denies the Charges Against Carpenter and Worcester and Indorses Forbes.

Manila, Sept. 3.—At a farewell banquet tendered him, Secretary of War Dickinson paid a glowing tribute to the administration of President Taft. He said the progress of America was unequalled and stood as a monument to Mr. Taft.

Among other things, the secretary said that the policy of government outlined by McKinley and Roosevelt had been carried out unchanged by President Taft.

Mr. Dickinson discussed the charges made in congress by Representative Martin, of Colorado, to the effect that Frank W. Carpenter, executive secretary of the Philippine government, and E. L. Worcester, a member of the Philippine commission, had acted improperly in connection with leases of "friar lands" in the Philippines, and said he was convinced that the charges were unjust and unfounded. The speaker heartily indorsed the administration of Governor Forbes.

Later in the day the Dickinson party departed for Hong Kong on the transport Crook, en route for Siberia.

### ONE DROWNED IN FLOODS.

Heavy Rains Overflow Rivers in Kentucky Mountains.

Lexington, Ky., Sept. 3.—Swollen streams following heavy rains over several mountain counties last night have resulted in the loss of at least one life and many thousand dollars worth of property which has been swept away in the flood commotion with points in Wolfe, Breathitt, Magoffin, Morgan and Knott counties was only partially restored this afternoon and meager reports from them tell of heavy damage, especially to railroad property.

At Van Cleave, Wolfe county, a daughter of George King was caught in the flood and drowned.

## OF INTEREST TO THE PUBLIC

Just that the people of Paducah may be wise to facts they should know and in justice to ourselves this statement is made.

In 1908 we entered the ice business in the city. Then ice was selling and had been selling for some years at 40 cents a hundred, with little or no attention being given to weights.

There was a cut in price, the opposition hoping to drive us out of business, and this we met by selling ice at 25 cents a hundred to large consumers and 30 cents a hundred to others. This price has been the ruling price up to the present "ice war" inaugurated on the 1st inst. by the Robertson ice company and the Paducah Brewery company, who wish to drive out opposition to them in the ice trade.

In this "ice war" fight we have a business interest and so have the people. It means to us a continuation in business, of course, but it must be at prices for ice which will enable us to pay for our ice and sell it at a profit; any other purpose would be suicidal, financially. In this "ice war" the people have more interest than ice for a month or so at prices which mean a loss to handlers of ice; this and nothing else, for if we are driven out of business

instantly ice will go up to the old figures, and more likely to 35 and 40 cents a hundred than to 25 and 30 cents per hundred. These facts all being beyond contradiction it means to us a continuation in business and the people ice at our present and reasonable rate. We must and will endeavor to protect ourselves by selling ice at 25 and 30 cents and the people must protect themselves, we feel and believe, in giving us their patronage as heretofore, if not more liberally. They must look to the future for themselves as we are looking for ourselves, remembering if we suffer then their time will come next. There is no denying the fact that ice has been sold by us cheap enough heretofore and there is no denying the fact that at the cut prices of Robertson ice company and the Paducah Brewery company, there is a loss to each, which some day the people will have to make good.

Need more be said? We think not! The people may be fooled for the time, but not all the time. "Ice wars" are on the people, first and last, not on us. We must have a business living or we must have a business death. This is the state of affairs in a nutshell.

The people will be wise to their own good we feel sure. We shall therefore expect and will continue to merit their patronage.
