

MAY BE BAD JAKE

BOASTFUL KENTUCKIAN, UNDER SURVEILLANCE IN WEST VIRGINIA.

Description and Photo of Noble Sent and Officers Expect Report of Arrest.

Lexington, Ky., Dec. 29.—County Attorney W. H. Blanton, of Breathitt county, has received a letter from a town in West Virginia asking for a description and a photograph of Jake Noble, who killed Jailer Wesley Turner in Jackson on the night of November 8.

The Breathitt officials refuse to give the name of the writer or the town until the case is investigated.

According to the writer of the letter, a stranger, considerably under the influence of liquor, overtook a constable on the way to town the day before Christmas and engaged him in conversation. The stranger said:

"I am one of the meanest men that ever left Kentucky. I have killed three men, and the last man I got was the jailer of my county."

The constable immediately reported the facts to the authorities of the West Virginia county and the stranger is being kept under surveillance until the Breathitt county authorities are heard from.

A picture of Noble and a good description were immediately sent to the writer of the letter and the Breathitt officials are expecting to hear of Noble's arrest at any time.

The rewards for the arrest of Noble total \$500. The county offers \$300 of that amount and the relatives of Turner the remainder.

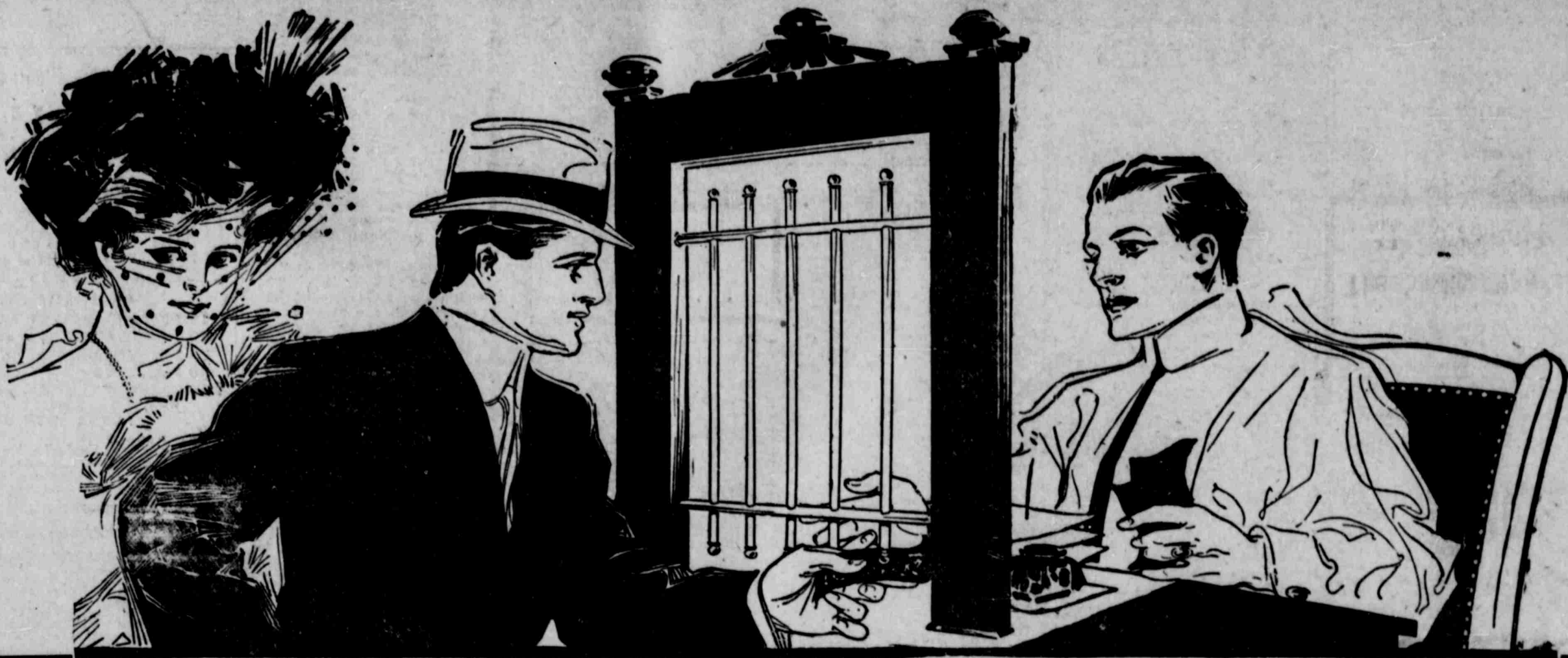

OVERCAPITALIZED

CUT EXPRESS RATES, IS ORDER IN CANADA.

Judgment Cites Case Where \$2,000,000 on Paper Represents \$100,000 in Value.

Ottawa, Ont., Dec. 29.—Overcapitalization and excessive rates are the chief findings of the Canadian board of railway commissioners as a result of two years' inquiry into the business of Canadian express companies. They are ordered to file within three months new tariffs along lines laid down by the commissioners. These will result in marked reductions. The present form of contract is found "grossly unfair" to shippers and ordered changed.

The judgment, which was rendered by J. P. Mabee, chairman, and concurred in by the other two commissioners, Mr. Scott and Mr. McLean, has no small interest for Americans, although it states that the Canadian companies are different from the United States companies in that they are owned by the railroads. The chief companies affected are the Canadian Northern, owned by the railway of that name; the Canadian, owned by the Grand Trunk railway; and the Dominion, owned by the Canadian Pacific railway. The history of the companies is reviewed in details with considerable caustic comment. The original capital of the Dominion Express company, which is owned by the Canadian Pacific railway, was

\$1,500,000. It was subsequently increased to \$2,000,000. The board finds trace of the actual payment of only \$24,500 cash and \$75,000 in land grant bonds. The gross revenue between 1901 and 1908 is set down at \$21,473,594, increasing from \$1,529,195 in 1901 to \$3,743,580 in 1908. For transportation the Canadian Pacific received during that period \$8,567,251. The general expenditure was \$9,264,455.

The Canadian Pacific railroad received total payments of 63.9 per cent of the gross revenue; the payments to the Canadian Pacific railway for station accommodations ran from \$10,000 to \$15,300 a month. The Canadian Express company started in 1865 with a nominal capital of \$500,000, of which \$275,000 was subscribed and \$27,300 paid. In 1892 the Grand Trunk bought all the capital stock for \$668,000. Its gross revenue from 1901 to 1908 was \$13,362,266, of which the Grand Trunk railway received \$8,467,397.

Facts on the Northern.
The Canadian Northern Express company started in 1892 with \$1,000,000 capital, of which \$300,000 was issued and \$5,000 paid in cash. Mackenzie and Mann and their associates, who control the Canadian Northern railway, were given as the owners of the express company. In 1913 to 1908 the receipts were \$919,183. The railway got \$353,126 for transportation.

DOCTORS ELECT

W. J. BASS BECOMES HEAD OF COUNTY SOCIETY.

Dr. W. J. Bass, who retires from the office of city physician Saturday, will be at the head of the county society for one year. He is a capable leader and will receive the support of the members. He succeeds Dr. H. P. Sights, now in Hopkinsville. Dr. Davis, of Lone Oak, succeeds Dr. H. G. Reynolds, who has been acting president during Dr. Sights' absence. Dr. Della Caldwell was the only officer re-elected. She has made an excellent record as secretary and was complimented for her untiring work.

The meeting last night was attended by about 30 members, the largest attendance of the year. Reports showed the society to be in excellent working order and the financial report shows that the so-

ciety is on a safe foothold with a promising outlook for 1911. The meeting was closed with a delightful banquet.
