### BIG DRIVE STARTS FOR LIBERTY BOND CAMPAIGN

Every Citizen is Conscripted to Help Assure a \$400,000 Purchase of the Bonds in This City. Every One Invited. Mass Meeting at Margaret Planned During the Week. Theaters Will Provide Opportunity for "Four-Minute" Men.

Anaconda, Oct. 15.—The two weeks' campaign to raise \$400,000 for the purchase of Liberty loan bonds in Anaconda started this morning. Every man, woman and child in the community is hereby conscripted to help in the good work. Those who can afford it should buy to the limit of their means and those who cannot afford to buy at least one bond should go halves with some other person and in this way contribute at least a little.

A very good idea has been suggested by Sig Goodfriend, who advises those holding deposits in the postal savings bank to use that money for the purchase of Liberty bonds. The bank deposits pay 2 per cent interest while the Liberty bonds pay 4 per cent and the same government is the guarantee for the two.

A meeting was held last evening at the Montana hotel at which Senator J. B. Giese was named permanent chairman and E. M. Dunn permanent secretary. After the meeting had opened with Maj. H. N. Blake as temporary chairman and F. W. Harrison as temporary secretary.

There was a general discussion on the work of raising the quota of \$400,000 for Anaconda.

#### Meeting Tonight.

Another meeting will be held this evening at the Montana hotel at 7:30 o'clock at which a report will outline the methods to be pursued in order to make the campaign here a hawing success.

The following committee was named to interest the ladies of the city in the campaign: Mrs. V. J. Applegate, Mrs. W. A. Bower and Mrs. L. E. Larson.

B. D. Mann was conscripted to point a Liberty bond campaign to be strung across Main street and E. E. Moore agreed to furnish the canvas.

A mass meeting will be held at the Montana hotel during the week at which out of town speakers will explain why citizens should from patriotic as well as expedient motives buy Liberty loan bonds to the extent of their means.

It was announced that the Imperial theater and the Bluebird theater are co-operating in the campaign most actively by voluntarily surrendering use of their houses for a short time every night for the next two weeks.

The thanks of the committee and citizens in general are due A. Mandoli and Mr. and Mrs. C. Scott for their patriotic action.

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### LIBERTY LOAN CAMPAIGN WILL OPEN WITH A FLASH

Butte's Allotment of \$2,800,000 Will Be Fully Subscribed by Saturday Night, is the Declaration of A. R. Currie, Chairman of the Board for This County. Final Meeting of the Committees Tonight.

"The opening gun will be fired tonight, and tomorrow the big drive will start. There will be no lull until the close Saturday night. Our slogan will be \$2,800,000 by that time."

This was the declaration today by A. R. Currie, chairman of the board in charge of Silver Bow county. He added that the final plans for the drive will be laid at a meeting in the chamber of Commerce room in the courthouse at 8 o'clock tonight. More than 150 representative citizens have been enlisted in the cause and they will be given their final instructions.

"There is no such word as failure," added Chairman Currie. "Two million eight hundred thousand dollars is a large sum of money to collect, but we are going to do it. We are going to show to the country that Butte and Silver Bow county are in the first row when it comes to patriotism. By Saturday night the entire county will have been covered and the allotment will have been subscribed."

#### McDowell to Help.

Lieut. Gov. W. W. McDowell has been enlisted among the Liberty loan workers. He received a telegram from A. R. Rogers of Minneapolis, chairman of the Liberty loan committee for the ninth federal reserve district, requesting him to assist Charles J. Kelly, who is in charge of the work of the district covering Silver Bow, Madison, Beaverhead, Deer Lodge and Powell counties. Mr. McDowell at once wired his acceptance. He takes the place of Eugene Carroll, who could not serve because he was called east on important business.

The women, under the leadership of Mrs. J. K. Heslet, started their drive this morning. While the men will con-

fine their efforts to the business section of the city, the women will invade the homes. Local banks reported that they have already felt the effects of the drive started by the women.

bonds was issued last night by Secretary Wilson of the department of labor. He said:

"The workers have more at stake in this conflict than any others, because it is only in a democracy that the common people can come into their own. The great privilege is not given to all of us to serve our country on the battlefield or in the trenches, but there are other ways in which we can serve and assist those who are privileged to carry our flag."

"The impulse of sacrifice for the common good is sending the youth of our country into the trenches in defense of liberty, humanity and democracy. Those who remain at home to till the soil, harvest the crops, man the factories, mines and mills, must make sacrifices also. The men who go forth to do battle in the field must be equipped. Funds must be forthcoming to furnish the food, the rifles, arms and other supplies for our fighting forces. Finances for this must be secured immediately from the sale of bonds and the workers can help by contributing their mite."
