Mayor Suggests Plan Where Woman May Raise Pork Without Annoyance.

At an informal session of the local exemption board, consisting of Mayor Maloney, City Attorney Telle, City Physician Dr. Matthews and City Clerk Charles Treacy, this morning the case of Mrs. Richardson and her 20 pigs was discussed. Mrs. Richardson, who lives on Gaylord street, was recently ordered by the health department to dispose of the swine because of complaints made by the neighbors. She appealed her case to the mayor, who brought the matter before the exemption board today.

Mrs. Richardson claimed she was "doing her bit" by raising pigs.

"I believe that the woman in this case is sincere and that she wants to help her country in every way possible," said the mayor. "Such persons should be encouraged in Butte."

At the conclusion of the discussion the mayor announced that he would find a location just outside of the city for Mrs. Richardson, where she may raise her pigs and continue to be the patriotic woman she has proved herself to be.
