## Economy Claims of Dixon Torn to Shreds, Edwards Exposes Gov.

Quotes Administration Organ to Prove the Governor Has Exceeded Expenditures of Predecessor—Citizens, in Mass Meeting, Name Committee to Demand That Dixon Give Figures for His Administration and for Similar Period of Stewart Regime.

In one of the most forceful addresses of his turbulent career in Montana politics, Frank J. Edwards, Farmer-Labor candidate for governor of Montana, last evening tore into shreds and left hanging like a shell-shocked banner the claims of the Dixon administration for economy in the management of state government.

For twenty-five years Mr. Edwards has been the political associate of Dr. O. M. Lanstrum, guiding genius of the Dixon administration, and his appearance at the municipal auditorium last evening to accept the challenge of the Montana Record-Herald to dispute the figures published by that paper on state finances, was something of a surprise to the audience of six hundred people which greeted him with a good hand when his tall figure walked to the stage.

Edwards had been the candidate of Dr. Lanstrum and the Record-Herald in 1916, when that paper fought every interest,

public and private, to elect him governor of Montana. He was five times elected mayor of Helena and in 1916 Dr. O. M. Lanstrum over his signature testified to the worth of Edwards as a public official, declaring him to be an honest man in every public endeavor and deserving of the governorship of Montana.
