unemployed in Montana. With wives and children that are dependent, there are more than 100,000 flesh and blood human beings who must have food, clothing, shelter, training, medical care and the other necessities of life. This means either jobs or doles, and doles wreck morale while producing nothing.

Almost before the ballots were counted, the New Deal chieftains had cut Montana's WPA quota from 22,500 to 11,000. Relief officials say it may be boosted back to 14,000 if and when Congress appropriates enough money. At the very best half of the state's load of distress must somehow be carried by it or by the various localities therein.

This is Montana's largest, all important, absolutely vital, life and death, economic, social, and political problem. It was not even mentioned in the Governor's message. Of what was Mr. Ayers thinking, or didn't he think at all?

Is it to be Democratic Party philosophy and policy to drive the thousands of helpless out among the sage brush and let them perish in this land of "prosperity?" The very thought of such a thing shocks every sense of decency and humanity. It is contrary to those basic American rights of "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness;" contrary to every teaching of the highest of all masters, Jesus Christ; contrary to that "liberty, justice and opportunity" for which our flag stands; contrary to the highest laws of all, the laws of God and self-preservation.

Mr. Governor, if this is to be your party's policy for the next four years you are in for some very bad times, so is Montana. The liberal members of the legislature have already slapped you in the face. In no uncertain terms they have demanded enough relief money to prevent starvation, pending time for more adequate plans.
