At 4 o'clock on Monday morning
last, the alleged murderer, McKim, was
removed from Bloomsburg Jail, by his
captors, Wolf and Keens, and the Sheriff
of Columbia county, and taken to the
Harrisburg Jail, there to be delivered up
to the Sheriff of Blair county. Circum-
stances and suspicion are strongly against
him, but he should have a fair trial.

The reward of \$2500 for his detection,

several places a great distance apart at the
same time. He has doubtless suffered
much while hunted as a fugitive; and was
finally caught in a most out of the way
hotel in Long Pond, in the S. E. corner of
Sullivan Co., Pa.

KILLER.--A man named Nelson Hun-
gerford, formerly of Orange county, N.
Y., was instantly killed on the 12th inst.,
about three miles above Trout Run, while
in the act of scaling timber down the
mountain. His body was horribly mang-
led, having one arm broken and head
and chest crushed in. He was a man of
no family.
