## JAS. GRANTHAM CALLED

James Grantham, 46, son of Mrs. Mary Grantham, of this city, passed to his reward Tuesday evening, following an operation in the local hospital.

He was born at Baron Furness, Lancashire, England, September 1875. When he was about 6 years of age, he, with his parents, came to America and settled in this city where he has spent most of his life.

In 1910 he was married to Myrtle Green of Tremonton, through which union six children were born. Most of his life has been spent in farming and mining. He was a good church worker and at the time of his demise he held the standing of an elder in the L. D. S. church.

At the time of the Spanish American war he attempted to enlist, but when he failed to get admittance there, he joined the Fifth Artillery, where he served for some time. While at the Presidio, California, he was injured when loading a ship. For this he received a pension.

Besides his aged mother and wife he is survived by six children, all under 10 years of age. They are: Lawrence, Goldie, Lucille, Edna, Jesse and James, the youngest is 4 months old. He is also survived by the following brothers and sisters: William Grantham of Park City, John Grantham of Duchesne, and Mrs. Jane McAllister of Garfield.

Mr. Grantham had been ill for some time with gall stone trouble. Saturday he underwent a successful operation but later complications set in and the end came late Tuesday night.

The funeral will be held today at the Third ward chapel at 2 p. m.
