## ALPINE STAKE CONFERENCE.

The 24th quarterly conference of the Alpine Stake of Zion, convened in the Lehi Tabernacle Saturday, Jan. 26, 1907 at 10 a. m.

There were present of the general authorities: Apostles George Teasdale and Hyrum M. Smith; and Elder Joseph W. McMurrin of the 1st Council of Seventy. There were also the Stake Auxiliary organization officers and a fair representation of Saints. Pres. S. L. Chipman presided. The singing was furnished by the Lehi Tabernacle choir. Meeting opened by singing "Come, Come, Ye Saints."

Prayer was offered by Elder Milan D. Atwood.

Apostle Geo. Teasdale expressed pleasure at being present with the Saints of Alpine stake. Spoke of the beauties of the gospel, and the advantages and blessings of same. Emphasized the necessity of every Church member being loyal to the cause of truth. Also touched upon the following topics: The Law of Tithing; The necessity of having faith to believe in God; The vicarious work for the dead; Divine authority; Divine revelation. Invoked the blessings of the Lord upon the Saints.

The choir sang the hymn, "Glorious things are sung of Zion."

Apostle Hyrum M. Smith said he felt a spirit of peace and happiness in this meeting. Said the church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints is the strongest religious organization on the earth. Dwelt upon the standing of the church, intellectually, financially, and spiritually and spoke of the vast amount of means and labor being expended by our people annually for the Salvation of Souls. The Gospel brings us physical advantages when we live up to its teachings. Admonished the Saints to give freely of their means for the building up of Gods Kingdom.

Jos. W. McMurrin felt that we ought to be grateful for the blessings we enjoy and appreciate the precepts and examples of our parents. Our allegiance to God and his work should stand before all other things.

Singing "Softly Beams the Sacred Dawning."

Benediction by Patriarch, Henry Moyle.

Second session convened at 2 p. m. Meeting opened by the choir singing "Now let us Rejoice in the Day of Salvation." Prayer was offered by Andrew R. Anderson.

Pres. S. L. Chipman gave a report of the condition of the Alpine Stake. In tithes, the stake had increased about \$65 last year over the preceding one. The stake Presidency are united and the Bishoprics are working harmoniously together. The Stake High Council had been appointed to visit the families of each ward in the Stake. Hoped the Saints would treat them kindly.

Bishop John Stoker of Lehi 4th ward reported same to be in good working order.

A mixed quartette rendered a number, entitled, "Sometime, Somewhere."

Elder C. C. Hackett recently returned from a mission in the Northern States made a brief report of his labors there. He visited Navoo. Its population is now about 1300. Was 2000 when the Mormons lived there. More elders are needed in the mission field. Said he was well treated while away. Admonished young men to prepare for missions.

Bishop A. L. Cullimore of Lindon ward made a brief report of his ward, showing a marked increase of tithing, and that the people in general are trying to do their church duties.

A selection was given from the new organ by Jos. F. Smith of Lehi.

Elder Jos. McMurrin said he had enjoyed the reports made during the meeting, spoke upon the law of tithing, advised the saints to pay their tithing each month, if they are paid monthly, if not, to pay as often as they receive returns from their labors.

Meeting closed by the choir singing, "Hark! Listen to the Trumpeters!"

Benediction by Pres. A. J. Evans.

The third session of conference convened Sunday Jan. 27th, 1907, at 10 a. m. with a much larger attendance of officers and members than on Saturday.

The meeting was opened by the choir singing, "Lo the Mighty God Appeareth."

Prayer was offered by Bishop Benj. Fulmer of Alpine.

A thanksgiving anthem was rendered by the choir.

Pres. James H. Clarke expressed pleasure at seeing so many present. Regretted that all were not present yesterday to partake of the good instructions given. Complimented the Saints on their general good works during the year 1906. By our works we are best known. The more we work in the cause of truth the better we like it.

Supt. Jos. J. Jackson reported the Sunday schools of the Stake. There are 10 parent classes with 3000 parents enrolled. There are enrolled 263 students and teachers, with an attendance of 75 per cent. There are enrolled 2,717 students with 67 per cent of attendance for 1906. Ninety per cent of the officers and teachers keep the word of wisdom and about the same per cent of them pay tithing. Felt that much good is resulting from the work done in the parent classes of the Sabbath schools. Urged parents to support these classes in all the wards of the Stake, and to assist in getting all children of the Stake into the Sunday schools.

Supt. George N. Child reported the work being done in the Y. M. M. I. A. There are 13 of these associations in the Stake, most of them in fair running order. The stake officers are united as well as the 100 ward officers throughout the stake. Many young men are not yet identified with the associations. The stake has improved on Era Subscriptions, but is not yet up to the standard desired. Advised all to read the Era and be benefited by its first class articles. The Y. M. M. I. A. fund is thus far better than heretofore. The percentage of attendance has been about 70 per cent of the permanent enrollment thus far this year.

The Choir sang the hymn on page 103. Pres. Rebecca Standing reported 13 Relief Societies in the stake, with about 800 members. They are doing excellent work. Officers are united and doing much good among the poor and the sick. Submitted a financial report, showing the Society to be prosperous in this regard.

Pres. Mary E. Whitby reported 13 Primary associations in the Stake. There is a good corps of local officers. Primary work is more systematic now than before. Urged parents to support the Primaries. The Stake Board consists of 11 members, who are united and meet monthly to plan their work. In 1906 three officer's conferences and one convention were held. A Primary conference was held in each ward of the stake during the year.

An Organ solo was rendered by Lulu Dorton.

Jos. W. McMurrin said he had enjoyed hearing the reports read. Commented on the significance and greatness of the holy priesthood, and showed that we should give our first allegiance to our quorum meetings.

Apostle George Teasdale spoke briefly on the value of intelligence. Emphasized the necessity of parents living the gospel as an example to their children.

Choir sang the hymn on page 189.

Benediction by Albert Marsh.

The 4th session convened at 2 p. m. Meeting opened by the choir singing an anthem.

Prayer was offered by patriarch Henry Moyle.

Supt. Edward Southwick of the Religion class reported briefly the labors of that organization. The workers therein generally are energetic. Asked the support of parents in this class of work.

Apostle Hyrum M. Smith spoke on the following topics: elders should speak by the promptings of the Holy Spirit; prayer and its necessity; the law of tithing; the necessity and benefits of obeying council; the need of reform in taking care of farm machinery and implements during the winter season; the duty of man to his wife and children.

John Y. Smith rendered a solo.

The general and stake authorities were presented and unanimously sustained.

Apostle Teasdale read from the Doctrine and Covenants, regarding the various gifts promised to the members of the church, and emphasized the necessity of our keeping in close communion with our Heavenly Father.

Pres. S. L. Chipman thanked the people of Lehi for their hospitality, and all who had in any way assisted to make the conference a success.

Choir sang the anthem, "O Zion When I Think of Thee." After Benediction by Elder Jos. W. McMurrin conference was adjourned for three months.

## AN ORDINANCE.

Providing for the issuance and disposal of \$23,000.00 of Water Bonds of American Fork City, Utah County, State of Utah Heretofore Authorized by a vote of qualified Electors of Said City at a Special Election called for that purpose, and held in said City on November 10, 1906, and Prescribing the Form and terms of Said Bonds.

Be It Ordered by the City Council of American Fork City, Utah County, State of Utah:

Section 1.—That American Fork City, in Utah County State of Utah, incur an indebtedness of \$23,000.00 for the purpose of supplying said City with water, and issue its bonds therefor; said indebtedness having been heretofore authorized by a majority vote of the qualified electors of Said City at a special election called for that purpose, and held in said City on November 10, 1906.

Section 2.—That the works for supplying such water shall be owned and controlled by said City.

Section 3.—That said \$23,000.00 of bonds shall be designated "Water Bonds."

Section 4.—That said Water Bonds shall be twenty three in number, numbered consecutively from 1 to 23 both inclusive of the denomination of \$1,000 each, dated February 1st 1907 and due February 1st 1927, with the privilege of pre-payment on or after February 1st 1917, and shall bear interest at the rate of five per centum per annum payable semi-annually, the semi-annual installments of interest to be evidenced by interest coupons attached to said bonds.

Section 5.—That all said bonds and coupons shall be payable in gold coin of the United States of America, of or equal to the present standard of weight and fineness, at the Deseret National Bank in Salt Lake City, State of Utah.

Section 6.—That each of said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor of American Fork City, countersigned by the City Recorder, and bear the seal of American Fork City, and the City Recorder shall endorse upon each of said bonds a certificate that the said bond is within the lawful debt limits of said City, and is issued according to law, and shall sign such certificate in his official character. Said coupons shall each bear the facsimile signature of the Mayor and City Recorder.

Section 7.—That there be, and hereby is, levied a direct annual tax, upon all the taxable property in American Fork City, sufficient to pay the interest on such indebtedness evidenced by said Water Bonds, as it falls due, and also to constitute a sinking fund for the payment of the principal thereof when it becomes due.

Section 8.—That when said bonds and coupons thereto attached have been prepared and duly executed they shall be delivered to the purchasers thereof.

Section 9.—That said Water Bonds and the certificates endorsed thereon and interest coupons attached thereto, be of substantially the following form, namely:

WATER BOND.

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENTS, That American Fork City, in the County of Utah, State of Utah, acknowledge itself to owe, and for value received, hereby promise to pay to bearer, the sum of One Thousand Dollars on February 1st 1927, with interest on said sum from the date hereof until paid, at the rate of five per centum per annum, payable semi-annually, on August 1, and February 1, in each year, upon presentation and surrender of the respective interest coupon therefor, hereto attached; both principal and interest, payable in gold coin of the United States of America, of or equal to the present standard of weight and fineness, at the Deseret National Bank, in the City of Salt Lake, State of Utah. And for the prompt payment of this bond, both principal and interest, maturity, the full faith and credit of American Fork City are hereby irrevocably pledged. The said City shall have the privilege of the pre-payment hereof on and after February 1, 1917.

This bond is issued for the purpose of supplying said City with water (the works for supplying such water to be owned and controlled by said city,) in accordance with a majority vote of such qualified electors of said City as had paid a property tax in said City, in the year preceding the election, voting at the special election called for the purpose, and held according to law in said American Fork City on November 10, 1906, and pursuant to, and in full compliance with the provisions of Chapter 18, Title 10, of the Revised Statutes of Utah in force January 1, 1896, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Utah, and pursuant to ordinances duly adopted by the City Council of said City, providing for authorizing and directing the issuance of this bond.

And it is hereby Certified and Recited, that all acts, conditions and things required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Utah, to be done precedent to, and in the issue of this bond, have been properly done, happened and have been performed in regular and due form and time as required by law; that the total indebtedness of said City including this bond does not exceed any constitutional or Statutory limitation; and that provision has been made for the collection of a direct annual tax on all the taxable property in said City, sufficient to pay the interest hereon and also to constitute a sinking fund for the payment of the principal hereof when and as the same becomes due.
