A Surprisingly Light Demand for Money.

THE ORE AND BULLION OUTPUT.

The Lowell Company's Notes—Bank Receipts—The Queen Strike—The Horn Silver—General.

The week has been without any particular transactions in business circles, other than we have already noticed. The Jennings' treatment, and the leasing of the Emporium to Mr. Thomas, have been the principal events, though other occurrences noted all tend to show that merchants are building their anticipations high for spring.

Mr. Schuler, at the Savings Bank, stated that money could be gotten now as well and as plentifully as ever, all that was wanting being the right sort of security.

Nothing is reported as having transpired in local securities. The rumor of something new in S. L. P. L. & H. Co., however, continues abroad. A reporter called on Mr. Lyon, the assignee of the Lowell Co., to learn whether any new developments, and how far, if possible, the delinquent farmers were to be pushed.

The Metal Market.

We quote from the Engineering and Mining Journal: New York, Friday Evening, Jan. 16. COPPER.—The market is undoubtedly firmer, both in Lake, for which 11 1/2% has been paid for a small parcel, and which may be quoted 11 3/4% @ 11 1/2%, and for other brands, pretty heavy sales of which have been made during the past few weeks at 10 1/2%.

LEAD.—Contending influences are at work to move the market, and it appears that a determined effort is making to create the impression that it is higher. It is reported that a sale of 500 tons was made at 2 7/8%, but this statement apparently lacks confirmation.

Apex.

There are slight indications of a "looking up," both on the street and at the mine. A broker yesterday stated that he could place a large amount of the stock if he could find any one willing to sell.

Mr. J. Martin, who recently sold the Red Bird to Mr. Packard for \$39,000, states that he is doing nothing in Tintic at present, but that sometime shortly he may sink a shaft on this property, when he feels confident of spotting the vein.

In the course of a chat with Col. E. A. Wall, superintendent of the Bullion mine, and owner with Col. Shaughnessy of the Eureka, a HERALD reporter yesterday learned that all the main properties in that district were looking as well as ever.

Crescent.
