STRIKE IS MADE IN THE PERUVIAN

Shipping Ore Is Encountered in the Lower Tunnel.

NATIVE GOLD IN PLANETARY

UTAH CONSOLIDATED DECLARES DIVIDEND OF \$525,000

After four years of persevering effort, in the face of many discouragements, the Peruvian Mining company has been rewarded by a strike in its property in the Little Cottonwood district. In the lower tunnel, 500 feet below the surface, a six-foot vein has been opened up. Of this a foot is solid galena of shipping grade, while the rest contains milling values. Drifting on the vein is now in progress, and as the work progresses the pay streak is found to widen, so that extensive shipments are assured by the spring, when the reads

Manager V. T. Clays came down from the mine yesterday with some fine samples of steel galena taken from the new strike. He took a collection of samples, representing an average of the face, to the assayer, and the returns were as follows: Lead, 20 per cent; copper, 1.5 per cent; silver, 38.9 ounces; gold value, \$3.60. The Peruvian property is located in Peruvian gulch, just off Little Cotton-wood canyon and a short distance below the town of Alta. About four years ago the present company began operations and shipped a little ore from workings well up the side of the gulch. Such a heavy flow of water was encountered that it became necessary to abandon the upper workings, go down the gulch and start a long tunnel to tap the vein at greater depth. It was expensive to drive the tunnel through the hard lime rock, all dead work, but, despite vicissitudes, the work, but, despite vicissitudes, the work was kept up. About a mon'h ago iron began to show in the face and after eighty feet more of work the vein was encountered 700 feet from the mouth of the tunnel. At first the ore was found in a seam only about an inch wide, but this gradually widened as it was drifted upon.

The present strike is about 400 feet

FOUR FEET OF ORE.

Fine Strike Is Made in the Century-Water Also Encountered.

Chicago, Dec. 22.—Wheat was extremely dull with practically no outside business. The foreign situation was considered strong, the world's shipments being light and a large decrease in the amount on passage being recorded. Large receipts and a bearish estimate of the Russian crop were the main bear factors.
