

IF IT HAPPENS
IT'S HEREGRAND PRIX IS
WON BY BARONFrench Jockey Rides Winner—
Royalists Go After President
as Part of Program.

Paris, June 27.—Baron Maurice de Rothschild's chestnut colt Verdun, with Barat up, today won the Grand Prix de Paris over the Longchamps course in a driving finish. The value of the stakes was \$74,155, the distance one mile and seven furlongs.

The classic event was contested over a sodden track in a drenching rain in the presence of 300,000 persons, among whom were thousands of Americans, who had come here from England and all parts of Europe.

W. K. Vanderbilt, who, with his bay colt Northeast, won the Grand Prix last year, was represented by Negrol and Oversight, the favorites in the betting. Lord Mickelham's William, which finished third in the English derby, heavily backed by the English contingent as second choice, and Union, a popular French entry, third choice, were the other main contenders.

Eleven horses entered the race, and when Barat fell William IV, closely attended by the Vanderbilt entries and Union, broke in front and set a terrific pace. He made the running to the end of the stretch, where Verdun and Rebell, finishing in that order, with Union third, all out under the whip. Barat, the jockey who piloted Verdun to victory, was the first French rider to win the Grand Prix since the inauguration of Napoleon III, and shared in the ovation given Baron de Rothschild.

It was the largest betting event in the history of the French turf, \$350,000 being wagered in the pari-mutuels.

The Americans, who backed the Vanderbilt horse to a man, returned to Paris with flattened pocketbooks.

Ross Adams' Christiana won the Prix d'Amiens, which was the first of a series of races which will be run at the Bois de St. Cloud, which has been a frequent winner here, failed to get a place in the Prix du Duc d'Aosta.

While returning from the races President Fallieres was surrounded by a large number of youthful royalists, who attempted a manifestation against him. The crowd turned on the royalist, and he was rescued by the police. The police finally rescued the manifestants, who were glad to escape from the angry crowd. Ten were arrested.

Over on City of Angels.

Los Angeles, June 27.—A difference of opinion between the Japanese and the American referees over the decision in the jiu jitsu match between Shosha Kokoyama, claiming to be the Japanese world's champion, and Eddie Robinson, a former prize fighter, last night, resulted in no decision being given, although it was the opinion of the majority of the spectators that the Japanese had the better of the contest.

The American referee announced that Robinson had won, but the Japanese referee vehemently claimed a victory for his countryman. The general opinion was that the American contestant did not confine himself strictly to the rules of the game and used his clenched fists, when he should have struck with the open hand. The affair was announced as being for the championship of the world.

The fatal fourth is all that stood in the way of another shutout for Pitcher Annis of the Salt Lake team. It would have been his fifth shutout in succession, giving him a record of forty-five innings without a run being scored, but luck was against him and Annis will have to content himself with a record of thirty-nine innings without a run, which will probably stand in this part of the country for some time. The big crowd of fans that gathered at the ball park yesterday was all with Annis in his efforts, and while no one would concede for a minute that Butte had a chance to win the game, all were pulling for a shutout. The fact that the locals piled up nine while Butte was getting one was a side issue, but it's over now and Annis has five shutout innings to his credit toward a new record. Kirby Hoon caused all the trouble. In the fourth, with one man out, Fitzgerald walked. He was out at second on Gardner's choice, and then Porterfield drew a walk. It was here that Kirby Hoon came up and sent a Texas leaguer over second, and Jarrett raised a slow second on the hit. However, it was Butte's only chance of the day to get a run in.

Marshall Hit Hard.
Marshall for Butte was not in big league form yesterday by a mile, and failed to hold the locals down as he did in the game pitched last Wednesday. He needed a few hits all around to fatten averages, and Marshall was very liberal toward them. But it was not hits alone that brought the runs across, for the team had an off day especially in the throwing line. A record of seven stolen bases shows only too plainly that the guardians of the base must have been dreaming on several occasions. The Miners did get busy on one occasion, and that was in the sixth, when, with the bases filled, the local boys began to play tag between third and home, resulting in their going out on a continuous play.

Little McQuaid came in for one of those occasional catches of his again in the fifth. Nehring had just raised a slow liner over third. Head jumped for it, stretching himself out to full length, but he failed to reach the ball. McQuaid, coming on the run, scooped the ball before it hit the ground after it had passed over his head, and quickly turning caught Dunn off second, completing a double.

Moore for Butte also did a remarkable back-handed, one-handed stop in the third when he robbed Head of a hit. Goodman and Luss were the hard-hitting "kicks" yesterday, getting away with three and four respectively.
