

# MISHAPS COME THICK AND FAST

Three Horse Accidents Result in Several Disasters Yesterday.

ALL WITHIN AN HOUR

MEN INJURED, RIGS SMASHED, AUTO DAMAGED, HORSE CUT.

List of Disasters.

- Three men more or less seriously injured.
- An express wagon and another rig demolished.
- An automobile badly damaged.
- One horse seriously cut and lacerated.
- A huge derick precipitated into a manhole where four men are working.

All of these occurred during three separate horse accidents within an hour yesterday morning, in the business section of the city.

While attempting to get ahead of a street car, a teamster, giving his name as Edwards, employed by the Inter-mountain Packing company, drove his wagon into a derick standing over a gas shaft at First South and West Temple streets, knocking the derick down the shaft, where a part of it struck Nick Fon, an Italian workman, inflicting a gash several inches long across his face. The main portion of the derick caught on a projecting plank. Otherwise four men would have been crushed to death at the bottom of the pit. Fon was treated at the emergency hospital at the city jail.

Series of Accidents.

A horse attached to a buggy, and driven by Al Mansky, barman at the Central Coal & Coke company's yards, took fright at the approach of a street car at Main and Second South streets at 11 o'clock, and dashed onto the sidewalk, demolishing the rig against the rail of the entrance to the Louvre cafe. The sidewalk was crowded at the time, and narrow escapes were numerous.

Freed from the rig, the maddened horse continued down the sidewalk on West Second South street, ran into an express wagon and caused the horse attached to it to leap forward several yards, demolishing the wagon against a nearby telephone pole.

The horse jumped over the hood of an auto left standing on the sidewalk, and mud guards with its hoofs and falling to the pavement, where it cut itself badly on the hind quarters.

Before the animal could rise again bystanders had quickly wrapped a rope around its neck and about a nearby post, thus effectually checking its career. Mansky was badly bruised by falling to the pavement.

Ankle Bones Broken.

The third accident occurred on West Fourth South street, about the same time as the other two. Albert Johnson, a teamster employed by Contractor John Smith, had attempted to urge a balky horse with the use of a whip. As he was leaning over from his seat with one leg dangling the balky brute struck out viciously with his heels, landing on the extended foot of the driver twice.

Anderson was taken to the emergency hospital, where Dr. F. B. Steele discovered that several bones in the ankle had been broken. Anderson, after having the injury dressed, was taken to his home at 34 East First South street.

# IDaho PROJECT TO OPEN SOON

C. B. Hurtt Tells of Big Lost River Irrigation Segregation.

C. B. Hurtt of Boise, Ida., president of the Big Lost River Irrigation company, and manager of the colonization department of the same company, was in the city yesterday to confer with the passenger department of the Oregon Short Line with regard to rates and arrangements for the opening to be held by his company on Sept. 14.

The Big Lost River Irrigation company has a Carey act project which includes 80,000 acres of land in Snake River valley, and is one of the biggest of the several large irrigation propositions now open or to be opened in Idaho this year. He says there is much interest aroused in this project, and that when he left home inquiries by mail averaged as high as 1,000 letters per day.

The land segregated in this project is located on the western side of Snake River valley in southern Idaho, at the intersection of Blaine, Bingham and Fremont counties. The water supply for the project consists of an appropriation of 2,000 second feet—continuous flow—of the waters of Big Lost river, supplemented by first storage rights on this river and a reservoir with a capacity of 100,000 acre feet, located in the canyon of the Big Lost river, a few miles above the town of Mackay. Registrations and drawings will be held at Arco, in Blaine county. Registration begins Sept. 5, and the big drawing will be Sept. 14. A great many Utah persons are interested.

# PROSPERITY IN ARIZONA NOW

Andrew Kimball Has Made Extensive Trip—To Be Here Some Time.

Generally prosperous conditions in Arizona are reported by Andrew Kimball, a delegate to the National Irrigation congress, who is in Salt Lake for a few weeks on business, returning from a trip that has included California, Washington, Oregon and Idaho. Mr. Kimball is president of St. Joseph stake of the Mormon church in Arizona and will remain in Salt Lake on church business until after the October conference.

Arizona is experiencing a remarkably prosperous year," said Mr. Kimball yesterday. "There has been ample rain and winter snow in the mountains. On July the summer rains started and have been in order every few days since. The crops consequently are abundant and the people are prospering. Two or three new canal projects are under way, extending from the old canals, and the people are taking up additional land as fast as possible. The average price for alfalfa during the past three years has been \$10 a ton. There is little rainfall during the summer months, but the crops are doing well. The valley is an oasis in the desert. It is surrounded by mining camps affording an excellent market with a ratio of 25 producers against 75 consumers. Scientists call the Gila valley the American Nile because the sediment brought down affords enough nutriment for one crop without drawing on the subsoil. It is possible to get two harvests off the same acreage in a year, reaping wheat in May and then planting corn.

"With hay fetching such prices there is but little profit in the creamery business. However some splendid pedigreed cattle and horses have been introduced into the valley recently.

"We have just completed our new academy building at a cost of \$30,000. It is constructed of cement blocks and consists of two stories and basement, fitted throughout with modern conveniences. School started on Aug. 22 and there are excellent prospects of heavy attendance. The people generally are energetic and are doing well."

## WIFE RELENTS; HUSBAND WITHDRAWS HIS SUIT

Within two hours after filing a suit for divorce from his wife, Augusta Panjan, on the charge of desertion, Pete Panjan changed his mind and the case was dismissed before Judge M. L. Ritchie of the Third district court yesterday. Panjan was married to his wife on August 15, 1908, and charged that his wife left him on July 1, 1908. They have two children—Pete, aged 11 years, and Mary, aged 9 years.

Panjan asked for a divorce from his wife and custody of the two children. But soon after filing the complaint Panjan met his wife and changed his mind when she told him she would go back and live with him again. The case was then dismissed and Panjan appeared content.

## WORK ON BRIDGE TO SPAN LITTLE COTTONWOOD

A large force of men are at work on South State street, putting the finishing touches on the new concrete bridge which will span Little Cottonwood creek. The bridge when finished will span the entire length of the street and cement retaining walls will be constructed on either side.

The work has been done under the supervision of City Engineer Ulmer. The tracks of the Utah Light & Railway will be laid across the bridge when the company's lines are extended to Sandy and Bingham Junction.

# DIRTY, WORMY CANDY SOLD

Olympia Candy Company Has Trouble With Pure Food Official.

Criminal proceedings against the proprietors of the Olympia Candy company, a Greek candy store on South Main street, will probably be brought within a day or two by State Food and Dairy Commissioner Willard Hanson for violation of the pure food laws of the state. The suit is a result of the purchase of some candy in the candy store yesterday by a young lady employee at the county recorder's office.

The candy was turned over to the state food and dairy commissioner, and was found to contain dirt and worms. The state commissioner went to the store with Deputy Smith and found a tray of the same candy. The Greeks in the place at first refused to allow the commissioner to confiscate the candy, but later turned it over to him and it was destroyed. Some of the candy was bought and this was sent to State Chemist Herman Harms, who found worms and dirt in it.

The candy was unfit for human consumption, but much of it had been sold during the day. It was placed on sale yesterday at special prices, and many customers bought of it. There have been several complaints of the candy sold at some of the stores, and the state commissioner will investigate these cases.

## CASES IN POLICE COURT

W. M. Resten Fined for Cruelty to Animals—Three Get Floaters and Negro Goes to Jail.

W. M. Resten was fined \$5 in police court yesterday for cruelty to animals. According to the arresting officer, Resten left his horse tethered in front of a First South street saloon all day and all night. At 3 o'clock yesterday morning the animal was taken to the police station and the owner was hailed from the saloon and locked up for the night.

John Bland, victor in a darktown row on Commercial street Thursday night, reaped the spoils in the nature of a thirty-day sentence in police court for battery committed on another negro.

Should Dan Murphy or Ed Ashton, who for months have acted as local receptacles for state street third parties, allow the sun to set on them in Salt Lake again they will be liable to 180 days each in the city jail. These two revelers drew floaters with a time limit yesterday.

Joe Murphy, of similar classification, must also forego the pleasures of Salt Lake for the space of three weeks, if he would escape that organization of philanthropic road builders commonly known as the chain gang.
