"The New Religion Predicted by President Eliot of Harvard" was the theme of an interesting discourse by the Rev. William Thurston Brown at Unity church yesterday. He explained what President Eliot's religion purported to be, why it is inevitable, and what it will mean eventually to the individual and to so-

It will be remembered that an address delivered last summer by President Eliot at Cambridge, Mass., the home of Har-vard, caused world-wide comment and was regarded as one of the most sensa-

idea that man is a fallen being; that it will have no supernatural element, but in all its theory and practice will be completely natural; its priests will be men interested in religious thought and trained to the best methods of improving the social and industrial conditions of human life; it will not attempt to recovering men. cial and industrial conditions of human life; it will not attempt to reconcile men and women to present ills by promises of future blessedness. Such promises have done infinite mischlef by inducing men to be patient under sufferings and privations against which they should have incessantly struggled. The new religion will approach the whole subject of evil from another side—that of resistance and prevention.

The Meaning.

'What, in simple words, is the mean ing of these epoch-making statements of the leading educator of America? In this new religion men and women are no longer going to think of any God at all outside themselves. A greater gain for this human world than that cannot be imagined. This world of ours will become genuinely and nobly religious, reverent, loving, just, happy, strong, self-reliant, godilke, only when it definitely discards the last vestige of its superstition about some God among the clouds and holds in its heart the sacred consciousness that in our own hands, in our

and holds in its heart the sacred consciousness that in our own hands, in our own minds and wills lies the key to the secret of life, to every happiness, to freedom, service, justice, joy.

"People are not going to care about the word God. Why should they care about an empty word, when they have the consciousness in awakened will, aroused conscience, liberated souls, of all that God can be? They are not going to revere a church or a priesthood any more. Whatever sanction or sacredness is to at-Whatever sanction or sacredness is to attach, under the regime of that new religion, which is as inevitable as sunrise, to anything you have or know sate as to anything you have or know must arise out of what that thing is, and from no

other source.

"Think of the tremendous logic of this address of President Eliot! Whence has the sanction of all our fundamental institutions come—not only government and civil law, but our moral codes, our domestic institutions, marriage, the birth of children, the home and its relations and obligations?

obligations?

"For every one of them we have been taught that there is a divine, supernatural sanction. We have been taught that human government is a divine institution, established by God, getting its authority and right by delegation from

That notion has as little to rest on as the Ptolemaic astronomy or the idea that the earth is flat and the stars are candles. Government is in no sense a divine in-stitution. It has grown out of brute stitution. It has grown out of brute force—the brute force of one class coercing another class into subjection. We have never had other than class government and never will as long as classes exist. What we have today is government by the commercial class, as a century or so ago we had government by a hereditary class. In the new religion the only sanction for any sort of government will lie in the needs and possibilities of men.

"Again we face the problem of right and rong, the problem of morality. The d and discredited religions have taught at knowledge of right and wrong countries."

"Whom God hath joined together let not man put asunder" we have been taught to say in most of our marriage services, and this in spite of the fact that about one in every five or six marriages now has to be put an end to by the state in the interests of common decency. If justice were done, at least half of the marriages contracted should be terminated, or never entered into. If a sanction is to be found for marriage and the birth of children, it must be found in what marriage actually is and in what children may in this world become—absolutely regardless whether there be another world or not—in conditions which shall make married life successful and desirable, in the process of making marriage possible for all healthy persons, and in some nobler and finer purpose by which marriage shall be found good.

"That purpose cannot be found in the mere propagation of the race. It has got to be shown that the race is worth propagating before it will have any moral value.

"Do you not know that today and for years past religion has not been and is not being taken seriously? I don't know why an alleged religion, which violates every instinct of intellectual self-respect, which lays on men's souls no heroic burden which beginns toward the future. den, which beckens toward the future with no inspiring incentive, which greatens men's souls with no gracious and beneficent task, should be taken seriously. It cannot be by same people. It can only enslave and shrivel and mislead the ig-

norant and promote that hypocrisy which is the dry rot of character.

"The only religion that can be taken seriously is a religion all of whose sacredness, all of whose moral authority, all of whose worth arises from the sense that in us men and women, and nowhere elsa, is all of God there is, all of authority there is, all of responsibility there is.

"We cannot know such a religion without knowing that it covers and concerns the whole of life, every day and hour, every relationship, every occupation—without being nerved by the resolution to make all we touch or handle sacred—by making life just and kind and free and fraternal."

Several Chilly Days in This Month Since 1878-Yesterday's Temperature.

Not since 1896 has Salt Lake experienced such a cold spell in early September as that which, during the past two days, caused people to ransack clothes closets for winter topcoats and wraps. The table given above shows the dates in September, since 1878, when wintry blasts have inaugurated the early fall season.

By a glance at the table it will be seen that the coldest day in early September since the weather bureau was established,

since the weather bureau was established, about thirty-five years ago, was on September 10, 1884, when the theormometer registered 37 degrees.

"These past records of low temperature probably occurred about or just before sunrise," said J. Cecil Alter of the local weather bureau yesterday. "However, the minimum of Saturday, Sept. 11, this year, 40 degrees, occurred about 12 o'clock, noon, and prevailed until the last of the half day's rain, about 1 p. m., making what is probably the noonday record for Salt Lake City up to this date in September."
