SEVEN DECREES GRANTED

WOES OF MARRIED PERSONS SUBJECT OF TESTIMONY.

Another list of Cupid's mistakes was aired yesterday at the weekly divorce matinee, when Judge W. W. Morse granted seven divorces.

Virginia A. Wood, on July 13, 1908, married Caroline Wood at Silverton, Colo., and they came to Salt Lake. August 23 she went to Denver for medical treatment and never came back.

Caroline Tremayne married Henry C. Tremayne here on April 2, 1905. She avers non-support, Mrs. Tremayne got \$25 a month alimony and custody of the two children with her decree.

Etha Sloan, supervisor of the boys department at the state industrial school, told of her marriage to William F. Sloan of Corinne, Box Elder county, on September 27, 1902, and of his desertion in Oakland, Cal., June 22, 1906.
