GROWERS UNSATISFIED

David Eccles Answers Demands of Raisers With Threat to Close the Sugar Factory.

conference between delegates of the newly organized Beet Growers' Protective unions in this county and David Eccles, president of the Amalgamated Sugar company, held last night, an open breach exists between the two interests. Flatly refusing their demands for a raise in the price per ton of beets and better railroad facilities, David Eccles announced to the beet growers that it was a question as to whether or not they wished to sell him their crops at the regular price this year or not at

As a persuading factor, Mr. Eccles holds over the heads of the growers the alternative of getting the old insufflcient price or nothing at all, threatening to shut down the local plant in case the demand is persisted in. In addressing the growers Eccles announced that if all differences were satisfactorily settled the capacity of the plant would be doubled this year, allowing the farmers an unlimited market.




