COAST LUMBER MARKET IS GROWING

Therea within a radius of fifteen miles of New York consumes six billion feet of lumber every year or nearly as much as the entire production of Oregon and Washington according to C. J. Hogue, New York representative of West Coast Lumbermen's association. But up until the beginning of the war (northwestern states sold less than 2 percent of their entire output in this area.

The east is becoming interested, however, in Douglas fir, Sitka spruce and west coast products and the market is growing and coast products are gradually displacing eastern woods.

The West Coast Lumbermen's association is now inaugurating a campaign of education among eastern consumers as to the advantages of northwest lumber products. This is of great benefit to northwest lumber states whose prosperity depends largely on a healthy lumber market.

While the lumber interests are creating a market, northwestern states can do their part by helping to maintain sound labor conditions and holding taxation and antagonistic legislation to a minimum. This will enable the mills to produce in competition with eastern and southern mills.

THE UNJUST TAX ON CANDY

It is sometimes sought to justify tax on candy on the ground that the government needs revenue and it must be secured from some source, and that candy is one source from which it can be secured, and that the public will stand for this tax.

This is a special tax which is inequitable, unjust and discriminating. Have things come to such a pass in this country that Congress is dead to all sense of fairness and justice?

In times of peace with ample opportunity to consider revenue raising legislation, Congress can offer no valid excuse for discriminating very grossly against one of the nation's most necessary and useful industries.

The question as to whether such a tax is unpopular or popular is beside the issue so far as the justice of taxing one industry and not another is concerned. It is the duty of Congress to do justice to all of the industries of the nation in matters of this kind.

The fact that a thing may be popular or unpopular is no indication as to whether it is just or unjust. The line between right and wrong is fixed and no human agency can change it. There is no reason why this injustice should not be corrected at once.

FOREST FIRES
