Why should we observe Fire Prevention day? To teach the importance of protecting life and property from fire, many of you have heard the ancient adage, that "What can't be cured must be endured." Formerly people felt in this way about fire. They thought that if their homes, their places of business, or other property were burned up, the fire should be considered in the light of an unavoidable accident. In Europe, however, many governments have had a quite different attitude. These governments have maintained that fire is a matter of personal responsibility and that it merits a personal penalty as an offense against the community. Recently several American and Canadian cities have taken a similar stand, and many of their residents whose property burns because they have not observed the fire prevention statutes, are requested to pay the cost of extinguishing such fires. This advanced step has been made possible because we know today that most fires are preventable, and they usually result from such careless acts as those of which we are all guilty. We are beginning to realize that a careful person in a wooden building is a safer neighbor than a careless individual in a structure of stone.

Our annual fire waste totals nearly three hundred million dollars. Property destroyed by fire represents wasted material and labor, even though the owner of the property may be reimbursed for its money value. The majority of fires occur in homes because of defective furnaces and fires, smoking, open lights, the thoughtless use of electrical appliances, stove pipes passing through attic or closets, careless handling of gasoline, or other causes that are generally preventable.

Never forget that gasoline is too dangerous to use without precautions, for example, the vapor from one gallon of gasoline, when mixed with air, has an explosive force equal to that of eighty-three pounds of dynamite. This will give you some idea of its dangerous nature.

A pile of rubbish offers a fertile opportunity for a chance spark, while if oily matter is present there is the additional hazard of spontaneous combustion.

Smoking is one of the most common causes of fire, the property loss each year from this habit running up into the millions. Careless smokers cast their cigarettes and cigar ends, or pipe coals into places where combustible material is present and fire ensues. Think of it, the small pleasure of smoking balanced against the destruction of millions.

There is another fire hazard that must not be overlooked, and that is steam pipes, the frightful Collingwood, Ohio, fire on March 4, 1908, was started by a steam pipe igniting a wooden joist and one hundred and seventy-three children died in this fire.

There is another side of the question of fire which is often overlooked. You may hear someone say "I'm not worrying about fire, I carry insurance." That person does not realize that the insurance cost is necessarily based upon the amount of fire hazard, and that he is paying his share of the expense of furnishing financial protection.

We must look farther than the mere money aspect of the situation. What of a man's moral responsibility for preventable fires? What right has any man to jeopardize the lives and property of his neighbors by neglecting to remove the hazards about his home or store, that are likely to cause fire at any time.

Fire is not a private matter, but something that affects the community. If I have a fire it concerns you, if you have a fire it concerns me. Once you realize this you will never again look upon a fire as an avoidable accident.

WILSON'S VIEWS ON STANDING PAT

(From the New York Herald)
In his Des Moines speech Mr. Wilson said:

"I had heard of 'standing pat,' before, but I never had before heard of standpatism going to the length of saying it is none of our business, and we do not care what happens to the rest of the world."

In his Indianapolis speech made January 18, 1915, talking about Mexico, Mr. Wilson said:

"It is none of my business and it is none of yours how long they (the Mexicans) take in determining it. It is none of my business, it is none of yours, how long they go about the business. The country is theirs. The government is theirs. The liberty is theirs. And so far as my influence goes, while I am president nobody shall interfere with them."

In an address to the Daughters of the American Revolution in Washington on October 14, 1915, Mr. Wilson said:

"America has a heart and that heart throbs with all sorts of intense sympathies, but America has schooled its heart to love things that America believes in, and it ought to devote itself only to what America believes in; and believing that America stands apart in its ideals, it ought not to allow itself to be drawn, as far as the heart is concerned, into anybody's quarrel. It is America first, is it not?"

In his third annual message to congress, December 7, 1915, Mr. Wilson said:

"We have stood apart studiously neutral. It was manifestly our duty to do so. Not only did we have no part or interest in the policies which seem to have brought the conflict on," etc.

When did he change his mind as to what "standing pat" means and when it should be or should not be applied
