PAROWAN.

Parowan, Aug. 30, 1903. In the changing vicissitudes of life one encounters many surprises, one of the most unexpected for was that sprung upon the school board of this district in the first of the month, where it was announced that this honorable body was contemplating "making a part of our grand school house into a dance hall." No such word has ever been given out officially, and if we publish all of Madame Rumor's assertions for facts, our county paper will lose its notoriety for reliability. But that is not the part we feel the worst about, but the appeal to the sympathies of the taxpayers, as though the late election would make a difference about their welfare being taken into consideration; whether or no the room is used for an occasional dance makes not an iota of difference in the expense, under every and all considerations the same kind of floor will be used. In the late ruling of the supreme court reference was made to the unscrewing and removing of seats and other school paraphernalia which, of course, would likely disturb and inconvenience school regulations, but in the present instance, if at a time when the people are invited from the surrounding towns, the trustees should think proper to provide suitable accommodations for entertainment, it would be only by using an unfinished, unfurnished assembly room which would in no wise make any difference to anyone.

No, we do not want "tobacco nastiness and bad whiskey bottles" around our school house, nor around our opera hall either. But say when we permit the business institute and political parties to hold forth in the classroom of our school house, are we proof against the annoyance? "Dance hall" may be good enough to dance in, that is all it will accommodate, but it is none good for our boys and girls; there is no earthly place that is. If at our entertainments we give our young people proper accommodations, such as comfortable seats, good music, pure, wholesome atmosphere and withal, a good management, we will vouch for good conduct as well as fewer "whiskey bottles," etc. Further, we do not expect the present school board will betray the trust of those who placed them in that none-too-desirable position.

the intentions of the Denver and Rio Grande Western. The purchase of the Taylor claims by the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company, and the resumption of work by that syndicate is all confirmation that the day is at hand when the iron horses will snort through our valley, and the immense bodies of ore that have so long awaited the magic touch of capital will reach their destination. Now which of those two roads will be built first to the iron claims? Senator Clark has not so far to build, but has not started yet.

HOMESTAKE AND COMSTOCK.

Development Work to Begin Thereon Immediately.

The Colorado Fuel and Iron Company are again at work in the iron district, and work is to be commenced immediately on the Homestake and Comstock properties. The shaft on the Homestake which is now 300 feet deep, and in which the water has risen to a depth of sixty feet, is to have the water hoisted out of it and drifting will then be vigorously prosecuted under the supervision of the company's agent, Mr. F. U. Nelson. This property contains both copper and iron, but iron is what the company is after this time.

The Comstock, upon which there is at present a tunnel 300 feet long, and which is said to run in the best body of Bessemer iron in Southern Utah, will be developed by sinking and drifting in the tunnel, and also by sinking shafts at different places with the claim and cross-cutting from the bottom of each shaft to determine the extent of the ore body. Contracts for the work on the Comstock have been let to Magnus Ahlstrom, Sam Pollock and others, and the work is to begin immediately. It is also reported that the company intend to begin work soon on the Blawout.

Men and Teams Wanted.

Mr. James Low of Beaver was in town the fore part of the week in search of teams and men to haul ore for the Majestic Co. of Beaver county, from the mines to the smelter. It is said that they will require about 500 tons of ore per day. The company has two mines from which they want the ore hauled, one distant four miles, for which they offer 70 cents per ton, and the other a distance of five or six miles for hauling the ore from which they offer \$1.20 per ton. At last accounts the gentleman had not been able to secure the number of teams that he required. Everybody seems to have all the work they can do.
