### AN ORDINANCE

(Continued from page seven)

"I hereby certify that this bond is within the lawful debt limit of Cedar City, Utah, and is issued according to law."

City Recorder and Ex-Officio City Auditor.

Said bonds and each of them shall be signed by the Mayor and City Treasurer and attested by the City Recorder and sealed with the seal of said city and the said coupons shall bear the fac-simile signature of the City Treasurer. The Mayor and City Treasurer of said City are each hereby empowered and directed to sign, the City Recorder to sign and attest and affix the seal of the City to each of said bonds and the acts of said Mayor City Treasurer and City Recorder in so doing are and shall be the act and deed of said Cedar City, Utah. All covenants, statements, representations and agreements, contained in said bonds and coupons and all recitals and representations of this ordinance are hereby considered and understood and it is hereby ordered and declared that said covenants and promises therein are the covenants and promises of said Cedar City and that the representations and statements therein are the representations and statements of said City.

And it is further stated and represented that said Cedar City is a municipal corporation and a city of the Third Class under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Utah.

Section 3.—All ordinances and resolutions, or parts of ordinances and resolutions in conflict with the provisions hereof, be and the same are hereby repealed, and after said bonds are issued, this ordinance shall be and remain irrevocable until said bonds and the interest thereon shall have been fully paid, satisfied and discharged as herein provided.

Section 4.—The interest falling due on said bonds on the 1st day of November 1920 shall be paid out of the general fund of said City and for the purpose of reimbursing said general fund for the payment of said interest and to meet the principal and interest accruing on said bonds on the first day of May 1921, also the interest accruing on said bonds on said first day of November 1921, promptly and as the same becomes due, there shall be levied by the City Council of said Cedar City on all taxable property in said City in addition to all other taxes a direct annual tax in the year 1920 sufficient to produce the sum of Seven Thousand Three Hundred and Ten Dollars (\$7,310.00) being \$5310 interest and \$2,000.00 principal, and to meet the interest accruing on said bonds thereafter promptly and as the same becomes due and also for the purpose of paying the principal of said bonds as they severally become due, there shall be levied by the City Council of said Cedar City, on all taxable property in said Cedar City, in addition to all other taxes, a direct annual tax as follows:—

In the year 1921 sufficient to produce the sum of \$5,420, being interest \$3,429 and principal \$2,000.00.

In the year 1922 sufficient to produce the sum of \$5,300.00 being interest \$3,300 and principal \$2,000.00.

In the year 1923 sufficient to produce the sum of \$5,180.00, being interest \$3,180.00 and principal \$2,000.

In the year 1924 sufficient to produce the sum of \$5,060.00, being interest \$3,060.00 and principal \$2,000.

In the year 1925 sufficient to produce the sum of \$4,880.00, being interest \$2,880.00 and principal \$2,000.

In the year 1926 sufficient to produce the sum of \$4,760.00, being interest \$2,760.00 and principal 2,000.

In the year 1927 sufficient to produce the sum of \$6,640.00 being interest \$2,640.00 and principal \$4,000.

In the year 1928 sufficient to produce the sum of \$6,400.00, being interest \$2,400.00 and principal \$4,000.

In the year 1929 sufficient to produce the sum of \$6,160.00, being interest \$2,160.00 and principal \$4,000.

In the year 1930 sufficient to produce the sum of \$3,920.00, being interest \$1,920.00 and principal \$2,000.

In the year 1931 sufficient to produce the sum of \$5,860.00 being interest \$1,860.00 and principal \$4,000.

In the year 1932 sufficient to produce the sum of \$5,560.00, being interest \$1,560.00 and principal \$4,000.

In the year 1933 sufficient to produce the sum of \$4,320.00, being interest \$1,320.00 and principal \$3,000.

In the year 1934 sufficient to produce the sum of \$4,140.00, being interest \$1,140.00 and principal \$3,000.

In the year 1935 sufficient to produce the sum of \$3,960.00, being interest \$960.00 and principal \$3,000.

In the year 1936 sufficient to produce the sum of \$3,780.00, being interest \$780.00 and principal \$3,000.

In the year 1937 sufficient to produce the sum of \$4,600.00 being interest \$600.00 and principal \$4,000.

In the year 1938 sufficient to produce the sum of \$4,360.00 being interest \$360.00 and principal \$4,000.

In the year 1939 sufficient to produce the sum of \$2,060.00, being interest \$60.00 and principal \$2,000.00.

Said taxes when collected shall be applied solely for the purpose of the payment of said interest and principal of said bonds, respectively and for no other purpose whatever, until the indebtedness so created under this ordinance and resolution, principal and interest shall have been fully paid, satisfied and discharged. But nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prevent said City from applying any other funds that may be in the City Treasury and available for that purpose, to the payment of said interest and principal and interest as the same respectively mature, and the levy of levies herein provided for to meet the interest on said bonds and to discharge the principal thereof, when due, are hereby appropriated for that purpose and said amount for each year shall also be included in the annual appropriation bills passed by the City Council in each year respectively.

Section 5.—The sale of said \$9,000 Lighting Bonds, consisting of bonds numbered from 1 to 9 inclusive, also \$50,000.00 Water Works Bonds, consisting of bonds numbered from 1 to 50 both inclusive to Palmer Bond and Mortgage Company, a corporation of the State of Utah, and the action of the City Council in accepting its bid and all acts and proceedings pertaining thereto, are hereby considered and are hereby ratified and confirmed and the City Treasurer is hereby authorized, instructed and directed to deliver said bonds when properly executed to said Palmer Bond and Mortgage Company, upon receipt of the purchase price therefor.

Section 6.—In the opinion of the City Council of said Cedar City, it is necessary to the peace, health and safety of said Cedar City that this ordinance become operative immediately, so that the work of establishing a lighting system as well as water works system may be commenced without delay.

Section 7.—Now therefore, be it further ordained that an emergency is hereby declared and that this ordinance shall take effect and be in force upon the day of its passage, approval and publication.

### PANGUITCH LAKE LARGEST EVER KNOWN THIS YEAR

### AN ORDINANCE

Creating, Designating, and Establishing Fifth West Street, in Cedar City, Utah.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of Cedar City, Utah:

Section 1. That there is hereby created a public street in Cedar City, Utah, to be known as Fifth West Street, extending south from First North street to Center street, in said Cedar City, Utah.

Section 2. That the center line of said Fifth West street commences at a point 59.4 feet south of a point 2501.28 feet west of rock in the center of Main street at Center street, and running thence northerly a distance of 1296.9 feet, to its intersection with said First North street, at a point on the south line thereof 2495.5 feet west of corner rock in the center of Main Street at First North Street, Plat "B," of said Cedar City Town Survey.

Section 3. That the width of said Fifth West Street is hereby established as being 33 feet on each side of said center line thereof, as described in Section 2 of this ordinance.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force on and after the 11th day of June, A. D. 1926.
